Plucky Little Oxford.

Not little in herself—not little in vim and enterprise, but little numerically and financially, as compared with some of her big sister towns.

But though comparatively little, she is plucky—the pluckiest of all the towns that entered the list for the Baptist Female University. To her size she beat them all. She beat every competitor but one, and considering numbers and strength, she beat that one. With one third the size and strength of Raleigh, Oxford beat her and fairly won the prize, so far as the contest lay between these two towns.

The published rules made it necessary for all the other towns to close their subscription books on Feb. 10, so as to be ready to put in their bids, in Raleigh, on the 11. But twenty-four hours after other towns had to close their books, and the bids of these towns were known, Raleigh was allowed to hold another meeting to increase her subscription. This was altogether unfair. But with all this unfairness she only came out third best.

But though, as compared with Raleigh, Oxford fails to get the prize, she has won; her effort has not been in vain. According to ability, having made the best showing of any competing towns, it will be a splendid advertisement of her life and enterprise. It will be another proof that Oxford is a town appreciating and favoring culture and refinement. It has developed something of the town's strength and interest in the matter of education. It shows that she must now utilize her strength in building up and fostering a school of her own, that will meet her demands as one of the old classic towns of the State.

A NEW COLLEGE.

OXFORD TO HAVE A STRONGER FEMALE SCHOOL THAN EVER.

To Be Owned and Under the Conduct of an Incorporated Company, and to Be Non-Sectarian.

The Chamber of Commerce met at the courthouse last night, with Capt. John A. Williams, president, in the chair.

After some entertaining preliminary remarks by different gentlemen upon the unfair manner in which Oxford had been treated and the location of the Baptist Female University decided upon, the meeting got down to the principal business of the evening.

This was the organization of an incorporated company to establish the Oxford Female College. The plan is to purchase the Seminary property, which is offered at reasonable figures, and convert it into a strictly non-sectarian school of high grade for young ladies and girls. Necessary improvements are to be made, thorough equipments furnished, and a strong faculty provided under the conduct of a board of trustees appointed by the stockholders.

A petition for articles of incorporation, drawn up in proper legal form, was read. The capital stock of the corporation is to be not less than five thousand dollars and not to exceed fifty thousand dollars. Shares are fifty dollars.

A large number of shares were taken immediately, and no doubt the entire amount wanted will be secured today. The number of shares one person can hold is limited, so as to distribute the stock well in the community and that all denominations be equally represented.

Messrs J. J. Hill and C. H. Van Horn, representing the North Carolina Building and Loan Association, of Charlotte, were present and invited to address the meeting. Mr. Hill spoke briefly and pleasantly, stating that the hour was so late he could not undertake a long speech just then, but Mr. Van Horn and himself would be glad to explain fully the plan and working of their association at another time. Dr. E. T. White moved that a meeting be called for tonight, at the courthouse, to give these gentlemen a hearing, which was carried.

The Chamber then adjourned.

Will Employ a Doctor by the Year.

The farmers of that neighborhood held a meeting at Stems yesterday antagonistic to the Granville County Medical Society, and decided to employ a physician by the year with a salary of from twelve to fifteen hundred dollars annually. The necessary amount will be made up by subscription.

IN A GENERAL WAY.

Important Happenings in Other States and Countries.

The lower House of Congress yesterday considered the World Fair matter. The new code of rules was adopted by a strict party vote of yeas 161, nays 145.

The Salem, Ill., National Bank was robbed last night of \$100,000 besides some securities. The burglars drilled through the vault door and then entered the vault and blew open the burglar proof safe and the book contents. There is no clue to the thieves.

STATE SIFTINGS.

North Carolina Items of Interest Clipped and Condensed from Exchanges.

The trial of J. P. Davis, for the murder of John A. Horton, in Chatham, some months ago, has begun in Pittsboro. He confesses that he had killed Horton and expects to be hanged for it. He furthermore says that this would be nothing but justice.

The Albamarle Presbytery, which had been in session at Raleigh for several days, adjourned yesterday. The following delegates were elected to the General Assembly, which meets in Asheville in May: Rev. Carr Moore, principal; Rev. J. C. McMullen, alternate. Lay Delegate—Capt. E. R. Stamps, principal and Col. Jas. S. Amis, alternate.

The mandate of the United States Supreme Court in the case of Cross and White has been received and filed, says the *News-Observer*. This mandate confirms the decision of the State Supreme Court, which tribunal had previously affirmed the sentence of Wake Superior Court. The sentence was that Cross be put to hard labor on the public road for seven years, and that White work the public roads for five years. The Attorney General will, on next Saturday, make a motion before the Supreme Court to have the judgment entered in conformity with the mandate of the United States Supreme Court. Mr. W. R. Henry will be present to represent the defendants. If the Attorney General's motion carries, the mandate will be certified down to Superior Court, after which the sentence of Cross and White will be executed by the Sheriff.
