

North Carolina Items of Interest Clipped and Condensed from Exchanges.

The trial of J. P. Davis, for the murder of John A. Herton, in Chatham, some months ago, has begun in Pittsboro. He confesses that he had killed Horton and expects, to be hanged for it. He furthermore says that this would be nothing but justice.

The Albamarle Presbytery, which had been in session at Raleigh' for several days adjourned yesterday. The following delegates were elected to the General Assembly, which meets in Asheville in May: Rev. Carr Moore, principal; Rev. J. C. McMullen, alternative. Lay Delegate-Capt. E. R.

The mandate of the United States Supreme Court in the case of Cross and White has been received and filed, says the News--Observer. This mandate confirms the decision of the State previously affirmed the sentence of Wake Superior Court. The sentence was that Cross be put to hard labor on the public road for seven years, and Miss Nora King, who is teaching non-sectarian school of high grade that White work the public roads for five years.
