Prof. E. Stone Wiggins, the Canadian weather prophet, has predicted a violent storm. He says it will be felt all over the world, and will reach Europe from the 17th to the 19th inst. It will burst over the continent of America between the 21 t and 22nd inst. Nothing short of a miracle, he says, will prevent the destruction of shipping that may be caught out of harbor. Volcanic eruptions and earthquakes will take place in the South and on the Pacific coast and also in Europe.

An Asheville de ective thinks he ha ocated Walter Bngham, the deaf mute murderer of Miss Turlington, at A tweep, Germany, and is so certain that he is on the right track that he has offered to go across the water at his own expense, if the government will reimburse him if the man is found to be the one wanted. A letter to that effect was written to the Attorney General, but he replied that he had no authority in the matter. The revard has been withdrawn, and unless the State cares to take some steps in the matter it will rest as it is.

An Asheville special to the News-Ob server of this morning says: News has just reached this place of a horrible accident near Hot Springs, Madison county, A twelve-year old son of S. D. Chambers, a highly respected farmer, accidentally shot and instantly killed his mother. The father had been to Hot Springs, bringing home with him a valise with some articles for the family in it. He put the value down in the house and stepped out. When the lad looked into it to see what his father had brought him, he found a pistol, and said to his mother: "See what pa brought home." The pistol was discharged, the ball striking his mother in the breast. Her only words were: "Oh, Lord, you have kiled me."

IN A GENERAL WAY.

Important Happenings in Other States and Countries.

The Louisiana Lotter y Company forwarded to the Government \$100, ooo to be used to protect the people of Louisiana against inundation in consequence of the Mississippi river. This money was declined by the Governor because it is on the eve of the session of the Legislature, during which the renewal or extension of their char ter will be acted upon.

A Montevista, Cal., telegram says Thursday night John McCan, Chas. Harris and Thomas Gallagher confined in the county jail overpowered the Sheriff when he came to give them their evening meal and escaped. The prisoners started up the Rio Grande River. Friday morning Sheriff Hecker with a posse started in persuit and yesterday morning at daylight their camp was discovered. The fugitives were called upon to surrender but in- ty yards of Main street. stead of doing so they fired upon the posse. The Sheriff returned fire, shooting three times and killing his three men. None of the Sheriff's posse suits. Fits guaranteed in every respect I was injured.

Meeting in Its Interest at the Courthouse Last Night.

The meeting at the courthouse did not bring out anything approaching a full representation of the business in terests of the city. Those who are most concerned in the establishment of the Oxford Female College and who would derive the greatest benefits were conspicuous by their absence.

There was a spirited discussion, engaged in by R. W. Winston, Esq., Capt. J. A. Williams, Capt. A. Landis and others. Nearly the amount required to secure the success of the undertaking was subscribed, and a committee composed of Mr. R. H. McGuire, Dr. R. H. Marsh and Dr. J. E. Wyche, were appointed to make a canvass of the citizens today and place the remaining shares.

The stockholders will meet tonight, and it is to be hoped that the matter will be settled then.
