Richmond & Danville Extension.

A correspondent from Danville to
the Richmond Dispatch says: "It
is definitely announced here to day that
the object of the Richmond and Dan-
ville railroad in making a survey for
a new line of road from this point is
to get an independent route to the
South. As is well known, the Rich-
mond and Danville now leases the
Carolina Central road between Greens-
boro and Charlotte as part of its
main line and the lease will expire in
a few years. I am informed by one
in authority that the business of the
Richmond and Danville from this
point south is so great that a double
track is now a necessity. The new
line for which the survey is now mak-
ing will give the company a second
track and make it independent of the
Carolina Central, which it is now
leasing. The present survey is from
Danville to Winston and survey is be-
ing made from both ends of the line.
From Winston the road will go to
Gastonia, just beyond Charlotte. It
is said that the work of construction
will begin as soon as the line is
located."

ter which more nearly concerns our
people: "A profile of the proposed
extension of the O. & C. R. R. has
been filed in the office of the clerk of
the court." Will our esteemed
contemporary enlighten us as to the
objective point, etc., of this proposed
extension?

THE LATEST NEWS.

CAREFULLY SIFTED FOR THE BUSY READER.

Items of Interest About North Carolina
Scissored and Condensed from our
Exchanges.

It turns out that the man in Stanley
county, N. C., who is the father of
thirty two children, was married three
times and not one time as was first re-
ported.

Senator M. W. Ransom is quite ill
at his home in Northampton with the
grippe. He went home from Wash-
ington Saturday and was taken sick
Monday.

A red hot Republican paper will be
started in Raleigh about June 1st,
which will deal entirely with local
politics. It will probably be a semi-
weekly.

The board of directors of the State
penitentiary submitted a financial re-
port of the institution of the last quar-
ter showing that the expenses had ex-
ceeded the earnings by \$10,469.73.

The Chatham murderer, I. P. Davis,
who is to swing next Friday, confesses
now that his name is William Shackel-
ford, and he is wanted in South Caro-
lina for more than one capital of-
fense.

Work has begun on a railway from
Asheville to Geo. Vanderbilt's subur-
ban place, "Biltmore," a distance of
three miles. The road will be built
and operated by Mr. Vanderbilt for
his private use in conveying material
to his place, and will be torn up when
his mountain palace is completed.

IN A GENERAL WAY.

Important Happenings in Other States and Countries.

The President was in Maryland
yesterday shooting duck.

The Blair bill was defeated in the
Senate yesterday. Yeas 31, nays 37.

The House yesterday decided the
Mudd-Compton contested election
case from Maryland in favor of the
Republican, Mudd, by a strict partizan
vote.

A disastrous fire at Jacksonville,
Fla., at 3 o'clock yesterday morning
destroyed two blocks of buildings in
Lafayette, a suburb, and a boarding
house in the city proper, causing a loss
of nearly \$125,000.

A Cynthia, Ky., dispatch says that
Benj. Crewell was lynched at Robin-
son Station last night by a mob of
about twenty persons. Two years ago
Grewell defrauded the farmers in
that locality by buying stock, and
paying for it with bogus checks. He
then fled to the mountains, but ven-
tured back, vainly thinking his evil
deeds had been forgotten.

McCauley, a conductor on the south-
bound Louisville & Nashville road,
was shot and seriously wounded by a
negro named Jake Daniels, and in turn
the conductor shot and killed the ne-
gro. This happened on the train yes-
terday afternoon while it was near
Bay Minette, Ala. The negro refused
to pay the rate of fare demanded by
the conductor, and the latter tried to
eject him but the negro resisted, drew
a pistol and fired, hitting the conduc-
tor in the right breast. The conduc-
tor fired four times hitting the negro
each time, and then stabled him with
a pocket knife. The negro died al-
most instantly.

THE TWO COLLEGES.

Raleigh Scores a Victory, and Durham
Has One in Sight.

The News-Observer of this morning
gives information of the action of the
boards of trustees of the Baptist Fe-
male College and Trinity College.
Concerning the former, at Wake For-
est, it says:

The matter of reconsideration of the
location of the College occupied the
whole time of the session of the
board.

Durham's proposition as originally
made was again before the board. A
long discussion of the question was
held resulting in the adoption of the
following resolution:

First. Resolved, That the board sees
no sufficient reason to change its de-
cision to locate the Baptist Female
College at Raleigh.

Second. Believing that \$50,000
and a site will be required for building
and equipping said college, this board
requests the brethren and friends of
Raleigh to raise said amount.

The vote on the resolution was
unanimous, not a single vote being
cast against it. The best of feeling
prevailed, and all the trustees present
expressed their determination to join
in harmoniously in making the Col-
lege a success. This vote is final,
and the committees on location and
building were instructed to select a
site at once, and make all arrange-
ments for the construction of the
buildings. Work will be begun some
time during the summer months.

A telegram from Durham to Raleigh
of last night reads:

DURHAM, N. C., March, 20.—The
trustees appointed a committee to ask
Raleigh to release them. The com-
mittee will visit your city and if the
release is secured the trustees will ac-
cept Durham's proposition.

Raleigh must give nearly \$120,000
or give up the College.

The Contract Let.

The contract for the new tobacco
sales warehouse for Messrs. Davis
& Gregory, to be built on the
Kingsbury property by Mr. W. E.
Owen, was awarded yesterday to Mr.
Jack Smith, of Halifax county, Va.
Mr. Smith is a builder and contractor
of many years experience, and prom-
ises a job first-class in every respect.
He will begin work as soon as the
weather opens.

The warehouse will be of brick, with
a handsome, stylish, two-story pressed
brick front, surmounted by a tall bell
tower. It will have a floor capacity
of 75x200 feet, with commodious
offices, large storage basement, sleep-
ing apartments for the farmers and
and brick stalls for horses. It will, in
fact, be of the best modern design and
complete in all its appointments. Mr.
Owen, the owner, says there is "room
at the top of the ladder," and he is go-
ing to put up a warehouse which will
surpass any in North Carolina.
