CIGARETTE TRUST INDICTED.

The Grand Jury Yesterday Bring in a
Bill of Indictment in Open Court.

It was known that at the last term of
the Superior Court the grand
jury of Granville county made a pres-
entment against the cigarette manu-
facturers who had been buying tobac-
co on the Oxford market. The pres-
entment at the time elicited much
comment and no one knew what the
outcome of it would be.

However, at that term of the court
no regular indictment was drawn. The
matter has since been quite much dis-
cussed and the prevalent opinion has
been that since the cigarette manu-
facturers had organized under one mam-
moth concern under the name of the
American Cigarette Company that
most probably no further action in the
premises would be taken.

It was, therefore, something of a
surprise late yesterday afternoon when
the news was borne from ear to ear
that the bill of indictment had been
drawn. There is no doubt it any
longer. The bill includes the names
of the cigarette manufacturers and
their agents in Oxford, to-wit: The
Dukes, Allen & Ginter, and the Kin ball
Company. Mr. J. M. Currin is in-
dicted as their resident agent on
this market.

The case will come up at the next
term of the Superior Court. Until
then no one can tell what will be the
outcome of the indictment.

Items of Interest About North Carolina Culled from Exchanges.

considerable feeling against the R. & D.
railroad here, and there is talk of boy-
cotting the road."

The citizens of Person county have
decided to have a grand celebration
next month in honor of the completion
of the railway to Roxboro.

Rev. Sam Jones did not get to Char-
lotte yesterday morning to open his se-
ries of meetings at the time announced.
He was delayed en route, and tele-
graphed he would be on hand this
morning and begin preaching at ten
o'clock.

The Clinton *Caucasian* says:
Avery Butler has admitted commit-
ting the horrible and unnatural deed.
The crime is yet veiled in mystery.
He refused to say why he committed
the crime, or whether he had an ac-
complice, but significantly remarks
that people will be surprised when the
story is told on the witness stand.
The prisoner's attorney waives an ex-
amination.

A special from Mount Olive, N. C.,
to the Wilmington *Messenger* says
that Mr. Solomon Rouse, an aged
widower who lived all alone about two
miles from that place, was completely
cremated in his residence last Saturday
night. The house and its entire con-
tents were entirely destroyed. What
remained of the unfortunate man was
only a few bones, not enough to fill a
half gallon measure.

The Charlotte *Chronicle* is informed
that the Secretary of the National Civil
Service Commission says that there
is a scarcity of applications for the
Railway Mail Service in the South
Atlantic and Gulf States, and to in-
crease the list special examinations
will be held in various parts of the
States above named during the coming
summer. One will be held at Char-
lotte sometime in May.

IN A GENERAL WAY.

Important Happenings in Other States and Countries.

Miss Rebecca Huhle threw some
rat poison in the fire at Greenbier
county, W. Va., and accidentally in-
haling the fumes from the flames, died
in great agony.

The grand jury of the United States
circuit court at Richmond, Va., yester-
day, brought in true bills of indict-
ment against Messrs. G. Waddey
Wilde, H. M. Smith, Jr., Preston Bel-
vin, A. B. Guigon, and several other
prominent Democrats, charging them
with conspiring to obstruct and delay
the voting in certain Jackson ward
precincts in the Congressional elec-
tion of 1888.

A New Orleans dispatch says the
real condition of things in the over-
flowed district is just coming to light.
No pen is equal to the task of pictur-
ing the devastation of the country or
the desolation of the people. The er-
ratic front of Point Coupee is under
water. Most of the levee has gone.
The water back of the levee is so deep
now that hundreds of lives are in jeop-
ardy. The small stretches of the
levee still standing are crowded with
men, women and children side by side
with horses, mules and cows. In an
old raised gin house five hundred ne-
groes were found huddled together.
Their condition was pitiable. They
were afraid of their lives and were pit-
tously begging to be taken to some
place of safety.
