TERRIBLE CYCLONE.

SINGLE COPIES: 5 CTS

Numbers of People Killed -- Excursion Boat Capsized.

ST. PAUL, MINN., July 14.-Reports from Little Canada, a village of three hundred people, seven miles from here, indicate that a cyclone struck that place with full force. At the regular monthly meeting of Twelve houses were blown down, three people killed, and eight or ten injured.

Between 4:45 and 5 o'clock the boatman at Lake Kolhmans met sixteen row boats, each of which carried from two to five persons, and only four of the sixteen have returned.

In a few moments the news was abroad that an excursion boat with over two hundred people on it was capsized in the middle of Lake Pepin. The boat was the steamer "Sea Wing," which came down the lake from Diamond Bluff, a small place seventeen miles north of Lake City. The work of pulling in the wreck of the boat was commenced as soon as it was light enough to see this morning.

An army of men were employed, and with the aid of axes and picks, a Emma Harris, board of prisoners, large portion of the cabin top was knocked away at an early hour. At 11 o'clock six bodies were taken Harris Bros., board of prisoners, from the cabin, and there are still

more deeper down under the water. The lake is filled with debris from the wreck--chairs, boards and life preservers strewn on the beach for a mile up the lake shore. Hundreds of citizens of Lake City flocked to the shore, tives of the missing ones whose bodies are still beneath the water. The general opinion is that the estimate of the loss of 125 lives will be verified.

ST. PAUL, MINN., July 14.—The entire village of Vadnais, six miles north of here, was wrecked by last evening's cyclone. Not a building was left standing in sound condition, most of them being blown to pieces.
