Writing just before the colored people's convention was held, a Raleigh correspondent of the Atlanta Constitution says: "It was at first thought a resolution denouncing President Harrison would be adopted. The leaders of the movement say tonight that they have information that the President intended to treat the negroes fairly, but was misled by the statement of the white Republicans who went to Washington after the election, and assured him that the appointment of negroes to any position of prominence would ruin the party in North Carolina." Are the colored voters sure that the President is not throwing sand in their eyes? Has he honored the race with any "position of prominence" at Washington or in any of the States, North or South?

The bone of contention in the lower House of Congress just now is the Compound Lard bill. The Republicans are bent on having the bill passed—because it will seriously cripple the cotton seed oil industry and injure the South. Cheatham protested the other day that this measure would do hurt to the colored people, but the Republicans do not care a snap of their finger for that. After the negro votes they do not care what becomes of him.

The Farmers' Alliance of Kansas is putting candidates for the legislature in the field who are pledged to vote against the re-election of Senator Ingalls. Ingalls is with the money bags and has nothing in common with the agricultural class.

It is said that Mott and Eaves have buried the hatchet and are good friends again, and that Eaves will be re-elected chairman of the Republican State Executive Committee.

The corners of the mouths of Republicans are down now instead of up over the political outlook in South Carolina. An united Democracy will march to victory.

The railroad trouble, started in New York, is extending westward, and it is probable every railroad in the West may be soon tied up.

Senator Vance's Amendment.

WASHINGTON, August 25.—Senator Vance today proposed an amendment to the tariff bill which provides that in

all cases where it can be shown by proof satisfactory to the secretary and treasury that any goods, wares or merchandise imported into this country have been purchased abroad by any citizen of the United States, by exchange of farm products grown in the United States for such goods, or where such goods have been purchased with proceeds or avails of such farm products in foreign countries, such goods, wares and merchandise shall be imported at the following rates, to-wit: (One.) On the present duty on all manufactures of iron and steel; 40 per cent on the present duty on all woolen and cotton goods, or articles of which wool or cotton may be component materials of chief value; one-half the present duty on earthenware, china and glassware; 30 per cent of the present rate of duty on all material used for fertilizers or in the manufacture thereof; and 25 per cent of the present rate of duty on jute bagging and farmers' binding twine.

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


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
