**THE LATEST NEWS.**

**SIFTED AND ARRANGED FOR THE BUSY READER.**

**Happenings in North Carolina and Elsewhere as Gathered from Today's Exchanges.**

The Raleigh State Chronicle has a young lady reporter. So has the Charlotte Chronicle and the Durham Sun.

The sixty-sixth annual session of the Sovereign Grand Lodge, I. O. O. F., is in session this week at Topeka, Kan.

Morehead City is to have a large shucking house. The oysters are to be shipped in barrels and canned in Baltimore.

The Republican State Executive Committee met at Raleigh yesterday, and elected F. T. Walser, of Madison, secretary. J. C. L. Harris was not a candidate for re-election.

Col. I. A. Sugg, of Greenville, of fees \$5.00 for the best pound of tobacco grown in Pitt county, proceeds to go to the Oxford Orphan Asylum, says the Wilmington Messenger.

The postmistress at Halifax is said to be in arrears \$700 with the post-office money. She is a colored woman, the wife of E. H. Davis, one of the leading negro politicians of Halifax county.

A double track railway tunnel under New York bay, between Staten Island and Brooklyn, is the latest scheme which is said to be favored by capitalists. The cost is estimated at \$63,000,000.

At Goldsboro Monday the Methodists had a good time in the dedication of St. Paul's M. E. Church. Several prominent preachers were present. Bishop Galloway was expected to have been present and preach on Sunday but by misconnection of the trains he failed to get there. Rev. J. T. Harris filled the pulpit on the occasion.

The Danville Register says: The first State Democratic convention of the new State of Idaho, was held at Boise City on the 27th of August. Hon. James W. Reid, late of North Carolina, and now of Idaho, was made president of the convention and made a rousing speech. In the convention, Mr. Reid was urged by his friends for the nomination for Congress, but declined.

A tobacco warehouse trust has been formed by the warehousemen of Louisville, Ky., and Cincinnati, Ohio. The title agreed upon is The Western Tobacco House Company. There are to be issued one million dollars in bonds secured by personal and real mortgages at six per cent; two millions preferred stock at eight per cent, and two millions common stock. H. Glover, of Louisville, is to be president, and the vice-presidency will be offered to L. H. Brooks, of Cincinnati, Ohio. Warehousemen are reported as being willing to take about \$2,000,000 of stock. It will require \$3,000,000 to buy in the property, and this will leave \$2,000,000 for a working capital.

The building committee of Trinity College awarded a contract for the main building to C. H. Norton, of Durham. The building will be 50x208 feet, and will have three stories and a basement. One million five hundred thousand rough brick and 300,000 pressed brick will be used, besides great quantities of lumber for inside work, and Durham brownstone for trimmings. Work will be begun at once. Two months will be required to raise the basement walls to the level of the ground. Tuesday, November 11th, has been set for the time to lay the corner-stone, which will be of green and pink granite from R. E. Lyon's quarries, near Durham. Preparations will be made for elaborate exercises in connection with the event. Norton will give bond for the completion of the building in a thorough, workmanlike manner by the 1st of August, 1891. This will be in ample time for the opening of the fall session of the college next year.

**TO HOLD THEIR COTTON.**

An English Syndicate will Loan the Farmers Money at 4 Per Cent. Montgomery Journal.

At the last meeting of the National Farmers' Alliance, the matter of arranging some plan by which the cotton producers could hold their crop for better prices, was referred to the cotton committee with power to make any arrangement possible to effect this end.

The committee at once opened communication with European capitalists, which has now been in progress several months, and it is given out in New York that the arrangements have been at last perfected.

A prominent alliance man from the south, who was in New York to confer with the representatives of foreign capitalists on the subject, and who is on the inside, said to the Journal correspondent this morning:

"The National Alliance has achieved a great work. The cotton committee of the national body has completed arrangements with European capitalists to advance \$32 per bale on 2,000,000 bales of American cotton to be stored in the warehouses of the south for a period of one year, allowing the farmer to dispose of the cotton any time during the year, should the price advance to his satisfaction. The European syndicate, which advances this money on the cotton, will charge 4 per cent per annum in their interest, and will be fully secured on which the advance is made.

These arrangements means that the farmers will have the use of \$64,000,000 and at the same time keep 2,000,000 bales of cotton out of the market.
