THE LATEST NEWS.

SIFTED AND ARRANGED FOR THE BUSY READER.

Happenings in North Carolina and Elsewhere as Gathered from Today's Exchanges.

Now Greensboro is reaching out for free postal delivery.

No quorum in the House of Representatives again yesterday.

Policeman Hogue's trial for murder will come off at Raleigh this week.

Rev. Sam Jones' meetings at Wilmington commence Thursday, Sept. 25.

The funds for the completion of the Orange-Keysville railroad in Rockingham county, Va., have at last been secured.

The estimated loss of the Richmond & Danville road in the big wreck will foot up at least \$125,000, says the Lexington Dispatch.

Col. I. A. Sugg, of Greenville, offers five dollars for the best pound of tobacco grown in Pitt county, proceeds to go to the Oxford Orphan Asylum.

F. T. Banks, who lives near Arrapahoe, Pamlico county, was bitten by a rattlesnake while helping a neighbor to raise a barn a few days ago. He is very low and not expected to live.

A woman went into a Chicago drug store and asked the clerk to look at her dog, which she held in her arms, and prescribe for it. One glance at the dog was enough to convince the clerk that it was mad. The beast was frothing at the mouth. The clerk ran behind the counter and saturated a handful of cotton with chloroform. The dog bounded out of the woman's arms and ran behind the counter. Two men drove the beast into a corner, where the clerk chloroformed him.

Sylvanus W. Pearce, a farmer of Franklin county, was shot in the abdomen a few days ago by William Davis, a colored boy fifteen years of age. Davis was "bound" to Pearce when seven years old and ran away three years ago. Last week he returned to the neighborhood and Pearce laid for him and caught him. Tying his arms Pearce told the boy to go with him home, when the boy managed to pull a pistol from his pocket and fire. Pearce's condition is critical. The boy is in jail.

A Chicago telegram of yesterday says: A committee from the local World's Fair directory waited on the South Park Commissioners this morning and laid before them the request of the National Commission that Washington Park be included in the site for the fair. After some discussion the South Park Commissioners decided to accede to the request of the National Commission. So the vexed question of a satisfactory site is at last settled. At this afternoon's session of the National Commission, the amended site proposition was presented and unanimously accepted. The site thus provided for includes Washington and Jackson Parks, Midway Pleasure connecting them, and takes a front in all of about 1,000 acres.
