OPENING OF THE CAMPAIGN.

A. H. A. Williams Speaks Today at Wilton--Brower Falls to Meet Him.

The campaign in this congressional district opened at Wilton, Granville county, today. This is the first of the Williams-Brower joint debate appointments, but Capt. Williams alone addressed the crowd, his Republican opponent failing to put in an appearance.

Mr. Brower telegraphed here this morning that, as Congress does not adjourn until tomorrow night and he being chairman of the committee on postoffices and postal roads, it was impossible for him to leave Washington in time to begin the canvass today. He will come as soon as he can get through with his committee business, and will probably be at Buchanan Thursday.

THE LATEST NEWS.

SIFTED AND ARRANGED FOR THE BUSY READER.

Happenings in North Carolina and Elsewhere as Gathered from Today's Exchanges.

Twenty-six young men were licenced Saturday by the State Supreme Court to practice law.

Four hundred soldiers were drowned by the collapse of a bridge during recent maneuvers of the Russian army at Kovno.

The President Saturday nominated William Wallace Rollins, of Madison, to be Collector of Internal Revenue for the Fifth North Carolina District.

Mr. Porter, Superintendent of the Census, who sailed for Europe Saturday, does not propose to return until November 1, as he is badly broken in health.

The *Manufacturer's Record* has secured one hundred and eighty-four names, members of the English Iron and Steel Institute, who have agreed to visit the South.

The only business of importance transacted by the Senate Saturday was the passage of the bill appropriating \$1,000,000 for the immediate purchase of nickel ore and nickel molybde, by the Secretary of the Navy, to be used in the manufacture of steel armor.

The *Charlotte Chronicle* says: The Queen City Shoe Company now has its shoe factory in full operation and expects soon to be turning out one hundred pairs of shoes per day. There are about thirty hands employed in the factory, and everything is working smoothly.

There are 2,165 Farmers' Alliances now in North Carolina, a 1 increase of 389 since January 7. This is not so great as the increase in 1889, but this year the various alliances have gained new members, so that there is a great increase in the order. The gain has been largely in the west.

The Bank of Madison at Jackson, Tenn., suspended Saturday morning. It was a State bank with a capital of \$50,000. President White has made an assignment of all his personal property for the benefit of his creditors. Liabilities \$200,000, assets \$225,000. The suspension is temporary.

Senator Vance has made the following appointments in this congressional district: Greensboro, Oct. 14; Roxboro, Oct. 17; Yanceyville, Oct. 18; Danbury, Oct. 20. Ex Gov. Jarvis will speak at the following places in the Fifth District: Roxboro, Oct. 1; Yanceyville, Oct. 2; Reidsville, Oct. 3; Walnut Cove, Oct. 4; Winston, Oct. 6.

The *News-Observer* of yesterday says: The citizens of Raleigh and Odd Fellows will together give Grand Sire Busbee a reception at the Yarbrough House on Tuesday night, 30th inst. Speeches of congratulation will be made by the Governor, the Mayor, Rev. Dr. Sanderlin and others, and, in behalf of the Odd Fellows of North Carolina, a beautiful emblematic jewel will be presented by Rev. Dr. J. H. Corden. Arrangements are being made for a joyous occasion. It is expected that many Odd Fellows from other portions of the State will be present.
