the merchants of Oxford that it is
against the law to sell cigars, cigar-
ettes, tobacco or anything else, except
medicine, on Sunday, and that he will
from now on see to it that this law is
strictly enforced.

Grant Moss, a colored boy, saw a
gun last night in J. F. Edwards' store
that struck his fancy, and he quietly
appropriated it and slipped away. He
was caught a short while after the theft
and provided with a sleeping apart-
ment in jail. This morning he was
before Mayor Smith and sent on to the

THE TOBACCO MEN.

Election of New Officers of the Oxford
Tobacco Board of Trade.

The Oxford Tobacco Board of Trade
met in the Opera House last night
with John B. Booth, president, in the
chair, and E. G. Bransford as secre-
tary.

The first business was the election
of officers for the ensuing year, which
resulted as follows:

E. G. Currin, president,
J. H. Bullock, vice-president.
O. S. Smoot, secretary and treas-
urer.

The new president appointed the
following committees:

Executive committee—J. G. Hunt,
W. A. Davis, J. H. Bullock, W. A.
Bobbitt and E. T. White.

Arbitration committee—W. C. Reed,
J. M. Currin, R. F. Knott, L. E.
Cooper and John Meadows.

Sales committee—E. O. Bransford,
O. S. Smoot, J. B. Booth, John Webb
and G. W. Knott.

It was moved and carried that the
board be incorporated, and a com-
mittee was instructed to have it done
at once.

A resolution was unanimously pas-
sed that the by-laws hereafter be
rigidly enforced.

It was agreed upon that the sales at
the warehouses shall begin at 9:30
o'clock every morning (except Sun-
day) the year around.

The time to report errors in buy-
er's bills was extended from seven in the
morning to two o'clock in the after-
noon.

A Rich Find.

A rare and valuable mineral—titan-
ium—has just been discovered within
a few miles of Oxford.

An analysis has been completed,
with the result of raising high expecta-
tions in the breast of the owner of the
property. The quantity is sufficient
to warrant the investment of large cap-
ital.

The commercial value of titanium,
we are told, is \$32 an ounce. This is
many times more valuable than a gold
mine.

Excursion Trains.

Excursion trains from Keyville to
Raleigh, to the State Fair, will be run
today, tomorrow and Thursday.
Will leave Oxford at 8.08, a. m., and
return here at 7.54, p. m.

Round trip tickets from Oxford,
including admission to the fair grounds,
are \$1.70, instead of \$1.20 as errone-
ously published. This is the same
fare as last year.

The population of Vance county is
17,563.

Justice Miller, of the U. S. Supreme
Court, died in Washington at 10:52
last night.

Gen. W. W. Belknap, Secretary of
War during President Grant's admin-
istration, was found dead in his bed at
Washington about nine o'clock yester-
day morning. His death resulted
from a stroke of apoplexy.

The Vance County Democratic
Convention Saturday nominated P. A.
Bobbitt for the House, Henry Perry
for Clerk Superior Court, R. A. Bul-
lock for Register of Deeds, E. A. Pow-
ell for Treasurer, J. R. Green for Cor-
oner, and Col. Hood for Surveyor.
No nomination was made for Sheriff.

A special to the *News-Observer*
says Gen. Joshua Barnes died at
Wilson yesterday morning at 7:10
o'clock at the residence of Mr. A.
Branch, his son-in-law. Gen. Barnes
had been in feeble health for some
time and his death was not unexpect-
ed. Socially and politically Gen.
Barnes was prominent in his section.
He had served as a member in both
branches of the legislature, and it was
by his efforts that Wilson county was
established.
