Rev. Thomas Mozley, the author of "Reminiscences of Oriol College," has a volume in press in London called "Letters from Rome."

Genial "Bob" Burdette spent the summer taking a pedestrian tour through Canada and Nova Scotia, accompanied by his son, Robert, Jr.

It is said that Sir Edwin Arnold will present to George W. Childs the original transcript of the "Light of the World," as a token of friendship.
