Mr. Harris was a native of David son county, the son of a Methodist preacher, and was forty-six years of age. He was left an orphan at an early age and, dependent upon his own exertions, he became a shoemaker and made shoes at Thomasville for the Confederate soldiers until he was army at Bentonsville in 1865. He had pluck and ambition and was determined to get an education. His career ought to be an inspiration to every

Returning from the war he took a shoemaker's bench and tools and went to Trinity College. For five years at this seat of learning he struggled to obtain an education, paying his way by mending the boots and shoes for his fellow-pupils. With all this, he could not pay all his expenses, but he had to go in debt. After leaving, he paid every cent of his indebtedness. At college he was a room-mate of Rev. Frank L. Reid, D. D., who furnishes us this incident showing the "stuff" of which Mr. Harris was made. He graduated with high honors, and within ten days after became pastor of C ry (Methodist) circuit, and has since ville circuit, Statesville station, and St. Paul's station in Goldsboro. He then served three years as Presiding Elder of Goldsboro District and at his death was closing out his second year as Presiding Elder of Durham District. In September last he was elected to succeed Dr. Dixon as superintendent




