COL. POLK.

The Farmers' Alliance has sustained a heavy loss in the death of Col. L. L. Polk, the leader and greatest man of the order. The high place he reached and the influence he wielded was not the result of accident—could not have been. He possessed the will, the ability, the character and magnetic qualities of person to lead. His hundreds of thousands of followers had every confidence in him—believed in him implicitly—all but idolized him. He was a man with a large heart, kindly, frank and approachable.

He did a great work in educating the farmers—in inducing them to read more, to keep pace with the progress of the world and to think. The seed he has planted will eventually bear fruit of incalculable and lasting value.

No North Carolinian since the war has attained a position of so much power and such national prominence. He is widely, sincerely mourned, and his memory will be cherished and his words and deeds treasured.

At the Third Party Convention in Durham on Saturday a committee was appointed to communicate with Hon. A. H. A. Williams and ascertain his position in regard to the St. Louis platform. If he does not stand squarely on it their purpose, so it is reported, is to urge that a candidate for Congress be nominated on Thursday, the 16, at Durham. The new party in Granville expressed themselves entirely satisfied that Capt. Williams

was a true friend of the farmer and was doing everything in his power for their relief, and said they would not oppose his reelection: and when his name was mentioned it was received with applause.

Col. Polk said to a friend a short while before his death that he should advise against the Third Party adopting a plank favoring the government ownership of railroads. He also said that the government ownership of the telegraph lines was more practicable, but that the country was not ready for that.

Blaine was opposed to the force bill. That is one reason why the Southern radicals and the bitter partizans of the North did not want him to be nominated.

POLITICAL POINTERS.

Epitomized from Press Despatches and Exchanges

Mr. Harrison is a sectional candidate of a sectional party. He has never looked with any favor upon the South, and in consequence the South has no great love for him.—Richmond Dispatch.

The vote by which Harrison was yesterday nominated shows that it was a victory for his white stipendiaries and colored mercenaries of the South. Had the choice been left to the Northern States, he would have been badly beaten. His Southern office-holders and their obedient negro associates pulled him through. He received 247 votes from the late slave States against 82 votes from these States for all others. This was very nearly half the vote that he received. Deducting these 247 votes given or controlled by his Southern office-holders, he would have had only 288, against 616 for his opponents.—Atlanta Journal.

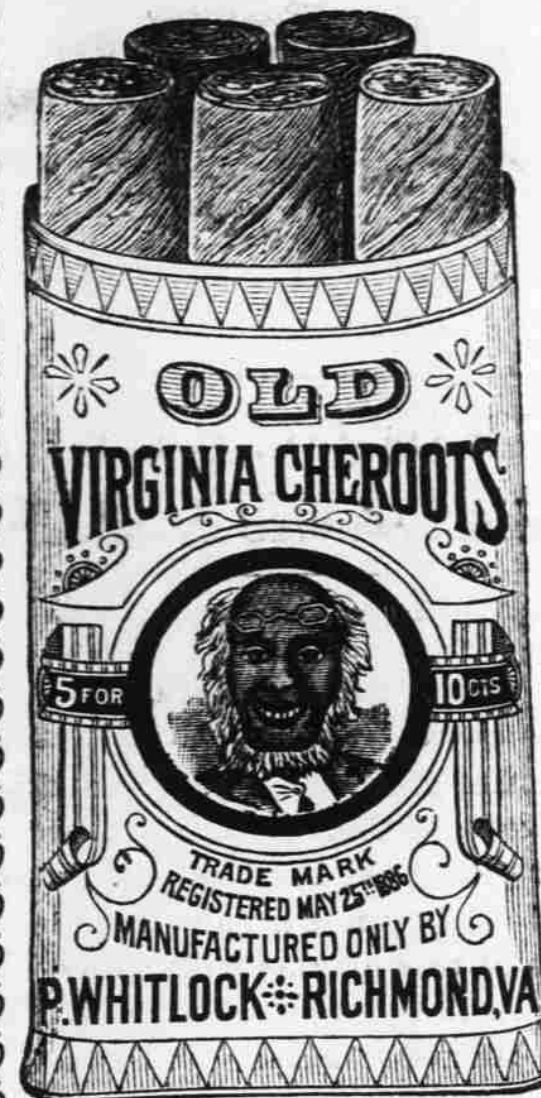
