Queen Victoria has been officially proclaimed Empress of India, after the mediæval fashion. On Tuesday the heralds and trumpeters went forth and sheriffs read the decree at the Royal Exchange, at Charing Cross and the Town Hall, Bretford. On the following day the imperial announcement was made at Edinburg Cross. The Scotch ceremony was most picturesque, and was conducted by the heralds, pursuivants and the Queens Trumpeter for Scotland, the Duke of Albany, His Royal Highness the Duke of Edinburg, who read the proclamation, which was responded to by the Marquis of Bute as pursuivant.
