Thime Class Mart Matter. The Post-office Appropriation bill, which passed the House Wednesday, contains a provision that third-class mail matter not exceeding four pounds in weight, shall be charged at the rate of one cent for two ounces, instead of two cents, as at present. This includes newspapers in
