**A Short Trip to Wake.**

I spent a few days last week very

Clements Academy, which is five

studies during the session. Also

music.

At 1 o'clock the Governor arrived  
and the whole school marched out  
to receive the Chief Executive of our  
State. Governor Kitchin stood on  
porch where everybody in and out of  
doors could hear him, and he made  
one of the best speeches of his life.  
He tried to impress, on the minds of  
the young the importance of an edu-  
cation. Everybody was invited out  
to dinner at 2 o'clock, and such a  
table—it was 80 feet long and full of  
good things from one end to the  
other. We ate all we could but

afternoon the boys enjoyed playing a  
few games of base-ball. Again at
