Misleading Literature.

Mr. F. R. McNinch, campaign manager for Governor Kitchin, has flooded Granville county with letters, in which it is claimed that the State Democratic Convention which endorsed Senator Simmons was "packed." It must be remembered that not less than 1000 delegates participated in said convention, and that if the Convention was "packed," it is passingly strange that Governor Kitchin did not find it out while rushing up and down the State before the Convention assembled and not wait until after the Convention had endorsed Senator Simmons' administration then cry "fraud," corruption" and "white-wash."
