THE COMMISSIONERS MEET

Jurors Drawn For November **Term of Granville Conuty** Superior Court.

The Board of County Commissioners met at the Court House Monday morning at 10 o'clock in regular monthly session. The minutes of last meeting were read and approved, after which the oath of office was administered to Mr. Norman Tilley, he having been appointed by J. G. Shotwell, Clerk of the Court, to fill the vacancy on the Board of County Commissioners caused by the death of Mr. W. P. Wilkinson. Mr. Tilley is one of the nominees for Commissioner and will no doubt prove a painstaking official and will serve the public with great credit.

Lee Hunt was put on the outside pauper list at \$1 per month.

Mr. H. C. Floyd was appointed to find out what it will cost to survey a road from the Franklin county line to Gray Rock.

The Board of Commissioner of Granville County will sell to the Department of Agriculture 250 acres of the present building site, for the sum of \$8,000, the Board of County Commissioners of Granville County reserving the present buildings on the farm, but agreeing to sell to the Department Messrs. J. B. Currin, of Stovall, and of Agriculture such buildings as they contained in said buildings; value to be estimated by a reputable contractor. Any building not wanted by the Department of Agriculture to be removed by the County Board.

It is understood and agreed that the Board of County Commissioners are to give complete possession by October 1, 1913, but if any crops are unharvestable at this time the Department of Agriculture will give time for removal.
