

Tariff Bill Becomes a Law.

Surrounded by leaders of a United Democracy President Wilson at 9:09 o'clock Friday night signed the Underwood-Simmons tariff bill at the White House. Simultaneously telegrams were sent to customs collectors throughout the country by the Treasury Department putting into actual operation the first Democratic tariff revision since 1894.

A happy group of legislators. members of Cabinets and friends encircled the President as he smilingly sat down and slowly affixed his signature with two gold pens. He presented the pen that had written the word "Woodrow" to Representative Underwood and the one that completed his name to Senator Simmons, both of whom bowed their appreciation. In impressive silence the President arose and delivered in easy, natural tones an extemporaneous speech that brought prolonged applause. He declared the journey of legislative accomplishments had not been completed; that a great service had been done for the rank and file of the country, but the second step in the emancipation of business was currency reform.
