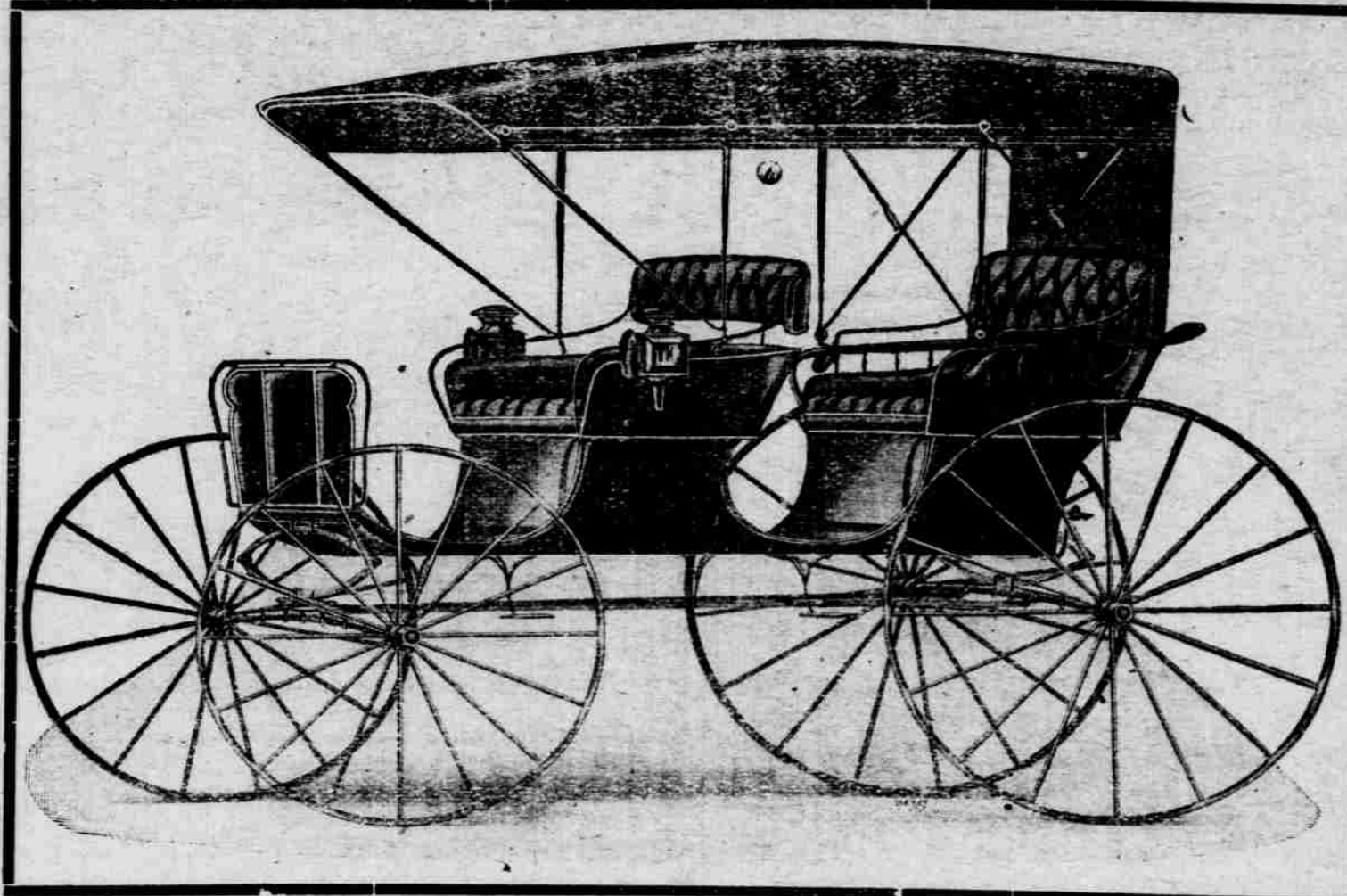


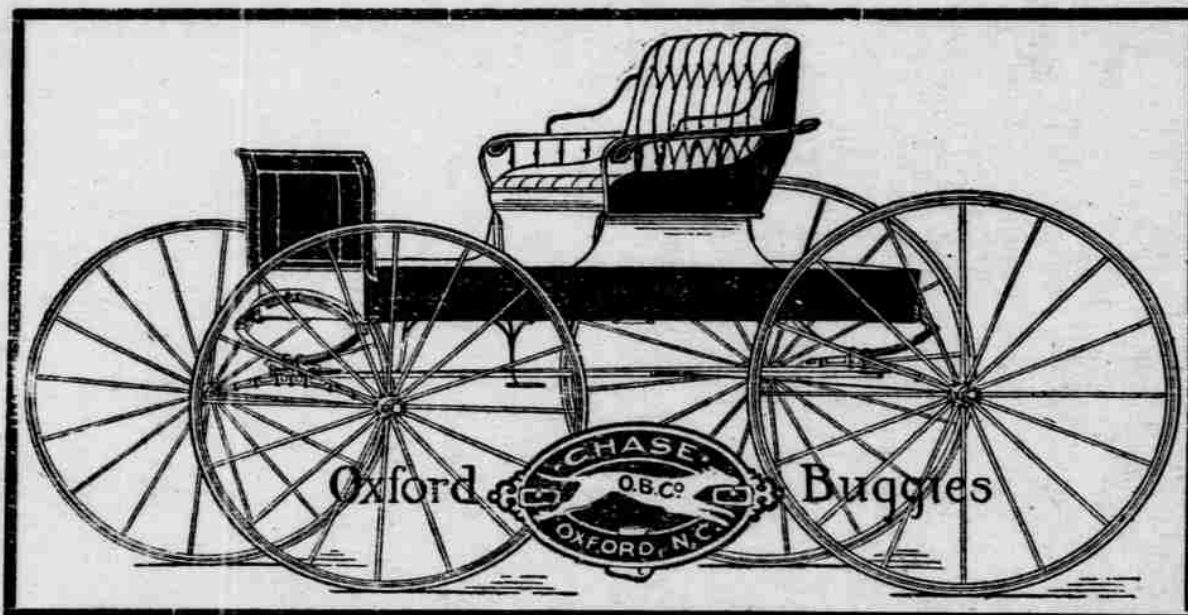

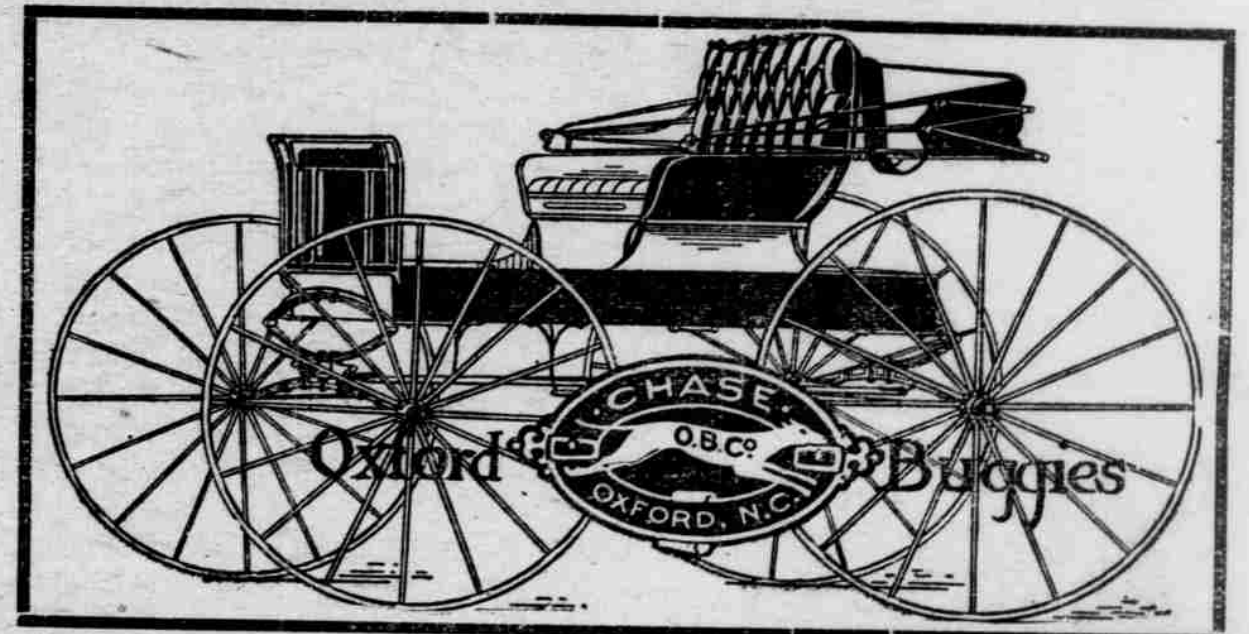

THE MASON IN SESSION

THE QUESTION OF A NEW MASONIC CODE

The Order Has Grown in Finance and Membership During Year

The one hundred and twenty-seventh annual session of the North Carolina Grand Lodge of Masons convened in Raleigh this Tuesday for the 1914 meeting. Much interest is manifested in the session, as there is much important business to be transacted.

Raleigh will be the mecca for at least six or seven hundred members of this Order from all parts of the State, and delegates are there representing more than 22,000 Masons. There are 412 lodges in North Carolina, and besides a representative from each of these lodges, there are a large number of members who came as visitors to the Grand Lodge.

The report of Grand Secretary John C. Drewry has just been completed, and shows something of the conditions of the order in the State both numerically and financially. Mr. Drewry reports that there has been a general revival of interest throughout the State, and that the officials of the various subordinate lodges have been prompt and accurate in turning in their reports and in sending in the funds collected. Nine new lodges were instituted during the year just closed, and all of these have started off well. Not a single lodge has been dropped from the rolls as defunct, a showing which is very creditable indeed, and which is not very often the case with fraternal orders.

The session this week will last through Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. A new Masonic code is to be passed or rejected by the Grand Lodge, and this is a matter of very much concern to the membership throughout the entire State. A majority of the subordinate lodges have already passed upon this code.
