FINANCIAL CHANCES IN MODERN FARMING

Wall street should cheer up. If it can't high finance any more railroads in the old fashioned way, which was somewhat detrimental to unsuspecting railroads, it can come down into North Carolina and farm.
The Street should not overlook the fact that a 300-acre farm of tobacco on the Atlantic Coast Line netted its owner \$70,000 last year and has him counting on \$60,000 this year. The fortunate man who owns the farm is Mr. J. A. Harps, a forward looking Ohio man who happened a few years ago to become obsessed with the possibilities of agriculture in Nation's Garden Spot. The Ohioan picked out North-Carolina for his and for that reason he is picking up a fortune. Not every man can do just what Mr. Harps has done, simply as a matter of course, but if he can do it the chances of others who can bank on their qualifications and enterprise are just as good as his. His success is significant of the fact that in North Carolina a new-comer who can do things can do them and get his in goodly proportion to what he does. A man really does not have to make a profit of even \$30,000 on 300 acres of land unless he wants to get rich quick and cock up his heels and take it easy in ten or twelve years. If he could only rake in net earnings of \$20,000 a year, in ten years he could jump the game with \$200,000 with which to buy North Carolina 4 per cent bonds that will yield him an income of \$8,000 a year for the balance of his life.
It should be stated that the far-seeing Mr. Harps furnishes us a notable example of creating productive values out of North Carolina land by means of modern farming. In the first place, he bought his land at a very low price, because some people had no idea it was good for anything but partridge nests and rabbits. It had no fixed or asset value when he got to tilling the soil and making it laugh, he created a new vision among land owners. He was the cause of bulging the price of lands in his part of the State, and it happens that the increased value of his own lands over the price he paid foots up a great fortune in itself.
Mr. Harps started in with luck and is keeping on having it, and the section where he settled is just as lucky as he is, because a man of his type landed in its midst with a big augur and just bored with it.
We contemplate with intense satisfaction the remarkable experience and success of Mr. Harps, but our lingering and lasting joy lies in the fact that a small farmer has opportunities in like proportion to those who come here and just spread themselves.—Wilmington Star.

CATTIE DEATH'S TOLL


That one-twentieth of all the stock bred on the open range of the West dies before it reaches a marketable age is the statement of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Poisonous plants sometimes kill half the animals in a herd almost over night; the storms of winter and drought of summer cover the plains with the bleaching bopes of cattle and sheep; diseases work sad havoc; insects "which madden and kill" wear away and waste many others. This report, issued last month by the Department, tells a story of lonely suffering and death almost beyond comprehension.
The government is actively engaged in trying to change these conditions which, in addition to all the suffering, are causing such an enormous economic loss. The officials of the Department of Agriculture have asserted that the loss from disease and exposure and ill-treatment among the cattle, sheep, swine and horses of this country would build a Panama Canal every twelve months.

NEARLY \$10,000,000 IN AUTOS

What do you think gentle reader of nearly ten million dollars being invested in automobiles in North Carolina, yet such is a fact. Inquiry at the Secretary of State's office shows that up to date license has been issued to 12,600 machines for the year ending June 30, 1915. Averaging these machines at \$750.00 each, which is an exceedingly low estimate, would show the value to be \$9,450,000. No wonder the cost of living has increased. And this is not the total number of machines in the state for quite a number have not yet paid the license tax. And they had better get busy for this tax was due July 1, and the department has instructed the sheriffs of the different counties in the state to get behind the owners of unlicensed machines and see that they come across with the cash at once, or be fined for their delinquency.
Last year the tax was paid on 7,618 in the state, showing an increase of nearly 5,000 machines, within the past twelve months. The tags this year are of a green color while last year they were white. There is one county in the state, Mitchell, in which the sheriff reports there is not a single gas wagon.

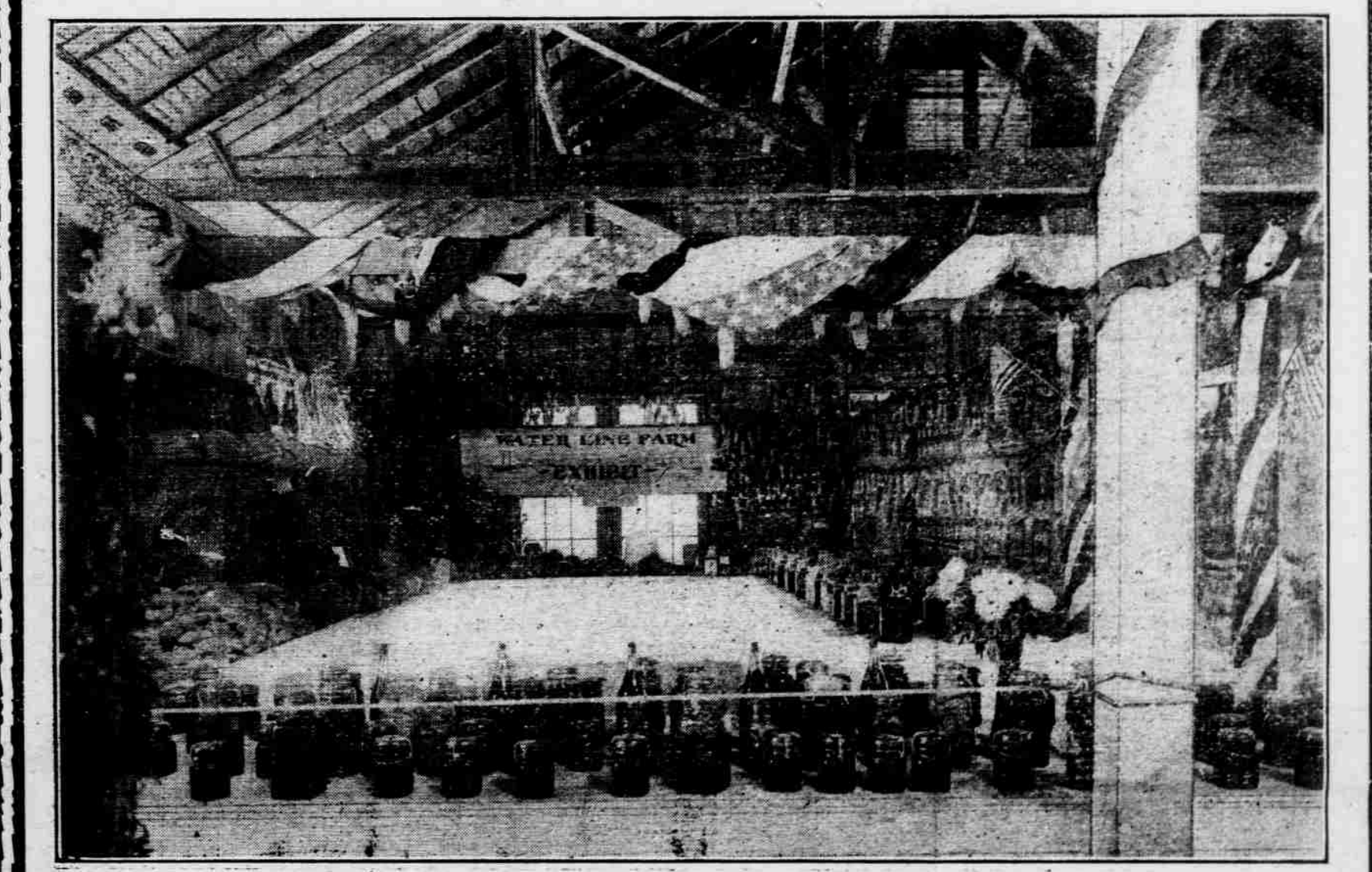


Exhibit of Water Line Farm, P. L. Thomasson, Owner.
