Card From Editor Hart.

In your paper of Wednesday, last, you carried an account of my incarceration, which, I think, is not an adequate account of the matter, and, with your permission, I would like to add thereto just a little.

It would appear from your account of the matter, that I voluntarily incarcerated myself. The facts are these: Of course, judgment was secured against me jointly with the Creedmoor Publishing Company at November term of the Superior Court of this county. Judgment was issued against the company on that judgment and subsequently it was thrown into bankruptcy and the property of the company sold, this occurring the 16th day of January. From the proceeds of the sale \$805.00 was derived, a large proportion of which is to be applied to the settlement of the judgment of the court. My incarceration, instead of being voluntary, is the result of an execution issued against me by Mr. V. T. Cheatham, the plaintiff in the suit. The sheriff, 'tis true, did not have to go to Creedmoor and bring me to jail, but on last Thursday, he phoned me that he had an execution against my person, and asked me what time would be more convenient for me to come, Friday or Saturday, and I asked him to let me have until Saturday to arrange my business and that I would then come without putting him to the trouble to come for me. As a result of the judgment of the court, the Creedmoor Publishing Company was put out of commission and I am incarcerated. That is the sum of the matter.
