Postoffice Cannot Accept Money for Delivery in the Balkan States
The postoffices will no longer accept money orders destined either to Serbia or Greece. The postoffice's only reason for this is that it cannot make the delivery owing to war conditions.

In this State, and in surrounding States, there are thousands of intelligent, hard-working Greeks and natives of the other Balkan States who are not only becoming property owning citizens, but who at the same time are sending small money orders home regularly to relatives or family in the old country. For a time at least they will have to keep all their surplus money here.

Why not have a home in the North Carolina section of the Appalachian National Park? The Forestry Bureau will open the New England division to the people and we should say the same privilege would be extended the North Carolina people if they desire it. The bureau will place 650,000 acres in the White Mountains at the disposal of Summer campers, the plan being to give Government leases on five-acre tracts for 30 years at \$5 a year. This would provide a Summer home for 30 years for \$150, and there would be no taxes to pay. This is the plan if Congress makes the additional appropriation for the Weeks law. The offer would be open to all the people and there would be no restrictions other than the proper observance of the forestry regulations.
