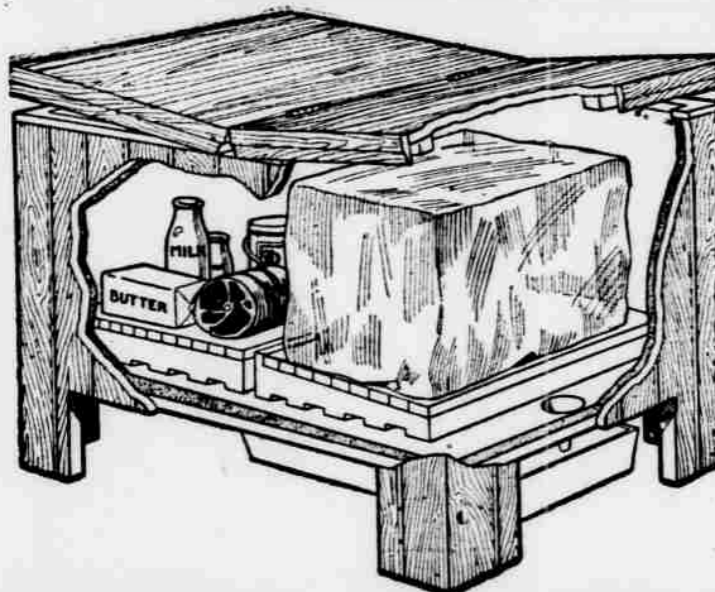

THE EVER-USEFUL HERB

The best herbs for drying are basil, marjoram, sage, savory, balm and common lemon thyme. They should be picked just before they flower, and on a fine warm day, never when they are wet. Spread them on paper to dry in the sun, in a cool oven, or on the rack over the fire. The drying must be done quickly or the herbs lose their color. When they are thoroughly dried, pick the leaves from the stalk, and if you think it necessary, dry again, then rub them through a fine sieve. The powder must be put into quite dry bottles and corked tightly. Of course, the powders must be kept separate and their bottles carefully labeled and stored in a dry place. When wanted for flavoring, tie up as much powder as you need in a piece of muslin.

If you want to preserve parsley for decorating cold meat dishes and so on, pick some large sprays of parsley and divide them into sprigs of a suitable size for garnishing. Dip them for a few moments in salted boiling water, then strain off all water, dry very thoroughly in a cool oven, and store in a well-corked, wide-necked bottle.

A "Bouquet Garni," such as is used for flavoring meat dishes, is generally composed of a bay leaf, a sprig each of thyme, basil and marjoram, with some parsley, tied together.

Mint is very cheap when in the height of its season, but at other times of the year it is difficult to procure. It dries very well, but mint vinegar is a nice thing to have in the storeroom. This is easily made. Fill a large-mouthed bottle with mint leaves, and cover with good vinegar. Place in a warm store-room for three weeks, then strain off the vinegar and bottle for future use.

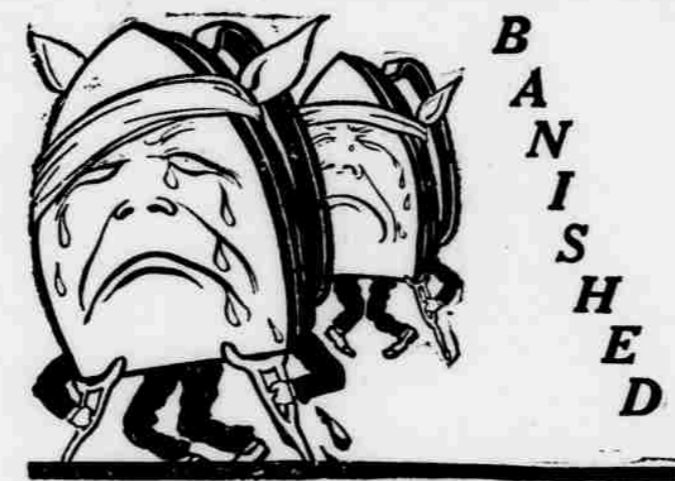
Mint sauce is another useful store sauce. Take a handful of mint, and dip it into a pan of boiling water in which a teaspoonful of bicarbonate of soda has been dissolved. The mint must only just be dipped in and out. This sets the green color. Dip it into cold water, and then chop very finely. Put an inch layer in a big bottle, then a teaspoonful of granulated sugar; repeat this until the bottle is three-parts full. Fill up with strong vinegar, and cork very tightly. Cover the top with brown sealing wax to keep out the air. When required for use shake the bottle, and pour out two tablespoonfuls, add an equal quantity of water, and the mint sauce is ready for use.

ARTERIAL ROADS TO BENEFIT

President Wilson Has Attached His Signature to Co-Operative Plan Resultant From Merging of Two Bills by Congress.

WASHINGTON—Co-operation between the national government and the States in highways improvement has begun on a country-wide program.

In the next five years \$150,000,000 will be expended on a half-and-half plan upon arterial roads selected by the highway authorities of the forty eight States subject to the approval of the Secretary of Agriculture.

The co-operative plan became effective when President Woodrow Wilson attached his signature to the concrete proposition which resulted in the merging of the conferees of the two bills passed by Congress, the Senate and House having adopted different measures.

With the Federal Aid Convention, conducted by the American Automobile Association in Washington, January 16-17, 1912, started the effort which finally resulted in the law just enacted.

North Carolina's Part is \$1,746,000

Added to the \$75,000,000 from the Federal treasury will be a like amount from the several States. The Federal distribution is on the basis of area, population, and rural delivery and star routes. The first-year appropriation is \$5,000,000, with a yearly increase of the same amount during the five-year period. Herewith is the total Federal distribution for the five years among the forty-eight States:

Total... \$75,000,000 A supplement to the bill which survived the report of the conference gives an additional \$10,000,000 to be expended at the rate of \$1,000,000 a year, on roads within or adjacent to Federal reserves.

In Remembrance of Soldier Boy

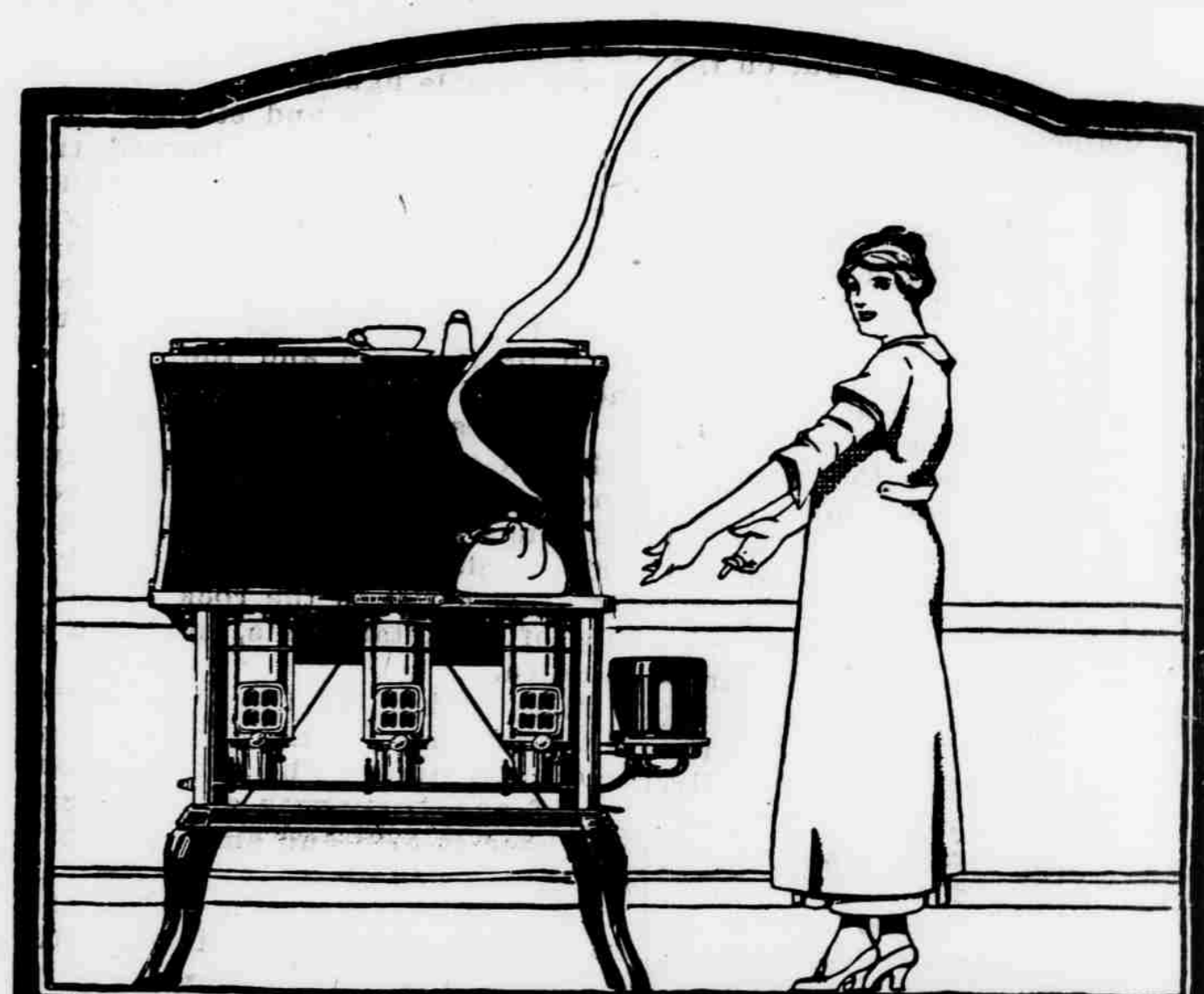
