Hester received six months on the roads for carrying a pistol. John Ragland pleaded guilty to carrying a concealed weapon. Jere Bullock was convicted of larceny. These two defendents had not been sentenced when this was written.

Carrie Bowden, a megro girl, was convicted of larceny and given six months in jail. J. H. McCain for the offense was sent to the roads for six months. In the case of Frank Mc-Ghee, the negro who shot the man over at the Fair Grounds, the injured man was too unwell to be present. The case was therefore continued and an order made admitting McGhee to bail in the sum of \$500.00 whenever the physician in charge of the injured man gives certificte that he is out of danger. Of course, the prisoner will not be allowed bail so long as there is a possibility of the death of the injured man.

Matthias Grissom was up for am assault and was hired out to Mr. J. W. Whitfield for six months. Graham Thorpe for an assault was fined \$10 and taxed with the costs. Allen Vaughan was bound over to court for disposing of mortgaged property. He failed to annear and his bond was declared forfeited. Pattie Rainey for retailing had prayer for judgment continued against her on payment of costs. Charlie Bowden was before the court for non-support of his familv. Judgment was, suspended on payment of costs and of a certain sum for support of his family. William Hicks, a characteristic hobo, was before the court for entering the house of Mr. S. T. Dickerson out at Dickerson and stealing certain articles of clothing. He was given 12

months on the roads. The most important criminal case was that against Bud or Jim Chavis for the killing of Will Bullock. Both parties were regroes and lived near Mr. William Thorne's in Oak Hill Township. According to the evidence it appeared that the killing was the result of an accident growing out of the careless pointing of a gut at Bullock by Chavis. At the beginning of the trial Solicitor Gattis announced that he would not ask for a veridet of murder in the first degree. After the evidence was in a plea of manslaughter was tenedered for the prisoner which was accepted by the State and Judge Daniels imposed a sentence of two years in the State's prison on Chavis. The result seemed to meet with the general annroval of those who heard the case tried.
