Utah's New Governor Wealthy

"Sion Bamberger, who apparently has been elected Governor of Utah on the Democratic ticket, is probably the richest man in our State," said Preston R. Lang, of Salt Lake City, at the Shoreham. "Mr. Bamberger came to this country from Germany a poor and friendless boy, but by dauntless energy and an ambition that never yielded to reverses, he worked his way to the front, and for many years has been recognized as one of the leading financiers of the West. Two years ago, when Senator Reed Smoot was a candi date for re-election, the friends of Mr. Bamberger wanted him to run, but he gave way to another. Senator Smoot narrowly escaped defeat, and it is still believed by our political experts that if he and Bamberger had been pitte against each other Smoot would have lost. The Governor-elect is greatly liked by men of all parties, and will make a splendid executive."
