MODERN BLOCKADE STILL

Its Peculiarities Described By Revenue Agents. Some of the stills recently captured by Sheriff Hobgood in Granville county, tallies out with the ones described by Revenue Agent Vanderford who was in consultation with Washington officials last week. "Why," said he, "the illicit still is a small affair compared with the old type of the Cleveland administration. We do not find any large plants now. Two metal washtubs are turned together, welded and converted into a still. Not long ago a concoction made in such a still killed one man and made two others sick in McDowell county. The fellow who died vomited himself to death. "The new product of the moonshine still is 'monkey rum,' a liquor made from molasses or sugar. It goes down beautifully, smooth, but oh my, the headache it brings. If a person drinks a cupful he will have to take two more to make him forget the headache that follows. Monkey rum is a head lifting drink."
