ument erected to Florence Nightingale, the founder of the Red Cross, and on this slab we find the words of our Master: "Blessed are the merciful." Just below this is the grave and statue of Sir George Williams, the founder of the Y. M. C. A. With bared head and reverent hearts we bowed around the brass statue that marks his resting place and our guide asked us to offer up a silent prayer and then he called on one of the "Y" men to lead and for all to repeat the Lord's Prayer. We were on Holy Ground and it was a holy moment. We then went to Westminster Abbey and stood before and over the great men of England, since 1066. A great brass slab in the Poets Corner is engraved Alfred Lord Tennyson. This is the greatest honor England could show him. The marble statue of Shakespeare is just above this slab. No man can describe these wonders, and I have made no attempt to do so. From here we were conducted to the House of Parliament and the House of Commons. One part of this building stands just as it was erected in 1066. A brass tablet marks the place where Sir Oliver Cromwell took the oath of office and another near by marks the place where he stood and received his death sentence. From the House of Parliament we went to visit the Royal Stables—not such a contrast as you might at first imagine. Here we saw the six sets of harness which cost \$80,000 and used only at the coronation service and at the opening of the House of Parliament. The stage coach is more wonderful still. It is 40 feet long, weighs 4½ tons, took three years to build, and is 155 years old. I also had the privilege of patting and rubbing "Delhi" the King's favorite horse, on the nose. So I can claim the honor of being allowed to visit the King's stable. There were possibly 200 horses there. The stables were great stone buildings, three stories high. There are just two more places I wish to mention that I think some of you will be interested to read a word about. This morning I worshipped at Memorial Tabernacle, the church made famous by the long and matchless work of Charles H. Spurgeon. Most of you know that Dr. A. C. Dixon, a native of North Carolina, is now pastor here. This afternoon I visited one of our American Base Hospitals. There are about 1,000 of our wounded boys there, several from North Carolina, but none from Granville county. There were certainly glad to see men just from the States. If you people could see what the Red Cross and the Y. M. C. A. is doing for your boys over here, where they need both so much, you would be grateful of the privilege of having an opportunity to serve in this way. I do not think that I shall find much time to write after I get located, but I just wanted to write these things to you folks "at home" while I could.

Please don't kick over your fare over there any more. We have not had a grain of sugar in our coffee since we landed, and there is not even a bit of sugar for our oatmeal. We take it straight, or sprinkle a little salt on it. It is impossible to get meat without a meal ticket issued by the Government. We had for break-

fast oat meal, coffee, (both without sugar), a salted smoked herring (I think, caught before the war), a slice of tomato and one strip of breakfast bacon. This is not just what a fellow found in the Granville county homes. I am not complaining, but simply telling of conditions over here. In fact, I am really enjoying many things that we consider hardships back in the States. The greatest hardship I have found so far is not to be able to have a fire. We have to go to bed to get warm. I am greatly enjoying my sweater and woolen socks. G. T. T.
