The consolidated Tobacco Company of America, which has absorbed the American and the Continental Tobacco Companies, files a mortgage at Jersey City for \$150,000,000. This is the most giant trust yet formed on the farmers product in the world.

The bedroom outfit of a man in Iola, Kan., comprises just two articles, a quilt and an alarm clock. On a recent sultry night, with his outfit under his arm, he went to the park, spread out his quilt on the grass, put the clock near the spot selected for his bed and deliberately went to bed.

Thomas Johnson, 78 years old and worth \$150,000, who died in Vincennes, Ind., the other day, was a curious character. He did not know how to read or write, never entered a church, was one of the most profane swearers and hardest drinkers in the city; was married four times, and always voted the Democratic ticket.

According to what a French physician says crying and groaning in pain are nature's own methods of subduing the keenness of physical suffering. He thinks that men should freely relieve their sufferings in this way, and that crying in children should not be repressed, as in doing so serious consequences may be engendered.

Forty years ago President Lincoln appointed John Jay Jackson, of Parkersburg, West Va., Judge of the United States Circuit Court, and he still holds the position. During all these years he has never failed but once to hold court at the appointed time. That was when Confederate troops under General Loring were in possession of Charleston, where the sessions were held, and the session assigned for that date had to be postponed.

The reports of greatest damage come from Hyde county, where the soil, vegetation and drainage are especially favorable to the mosquito. About 200 horses have died there from disease inoculated into the system by the mosquito, and quite as many are now sick. It is estimated that already the loss to the farmers of the county amounts to \$20,000, and it will reach much higher figures unless the disease can be speedily checked.—News and Observer.

The Farmers' State Alliance held its 15th annual session at Hillsboro Tuesday and Wednesday, W. A. Graham president; T. B. Parker, secretary. The attendance was about the same as last year, about 60. A resolution was adopted asking that all cotton farmers in the State unite in selling their cotton seed through the State business agent, in order to increase prices. Another was of regret at the death of the widow of Col. L. L. Polk. The thanks of the Alliance were tendered Governor Aycock for placing the Agricultural and Mechanical College under the control of the board of agriculture, entirely composed of practical farmers. A resolution was adopted asking that a club house or mess hall be established at this college, so that students can board themselves as at other colleges.

MAKING OF GREAT MEN.
There are few subjects about which more nonsense has been written than the making of great men. And about the culmination of it is reached in a late writer holding our colleges responsible for not turning out more of them, as well as great theologians. Colleges are magnificent opportunities, but possess no patent methods for the production of greatness. This, as usually understood, is a combination of natural or acquired endowment, circumstance and chance. The acquired endowment is in the gift of education but no more, and frequently it is the smallest factor in success. Nothing is more common and at the same time more unreasonable than to assume that those who are most in the eyes of the public, notably statesmen and such, are the true representatives of greatness.

THE DOGS OF WAR.
The use of dogs in the English army for war purposes continues to be discussed as though a novelty, says a writer. Far from it. The "dogs of war" have been more than a figure of speech for thousands of years. They were used in Egypt 400 B. C. The Romans, the Teutons and other fighting nations of antiquity depended much on them for sentinel and defense purposes. In the Middle Ages they are said to have even worn armor. Like the foxes with the burning brands in the fields of the Philistines, sometimes packs of them with port-fires on their backs carried flames and destruction into beleaguered towns or camps. The Spanish discoverers used bloodhounds in tracking the Indians in this country, and dogs were likewise, it is stated, made of service by our armies in the Philippines. In old days various breeds were employed, but at present the preference is given to the collie.

UNCLE SAM'S SALARY LIST.
According to the latest official list there are 19,445 public functionaries of various kinds and degrees employed in Washington City conducting numerous departments and bureaus of the Federal Government. These are the civilians appointees in the executive departments and do not include Senators and Representatives and several hundred employes of the houses who vibrate between the capital and their homes in other parts of the country. Nor does this aggregate include 350 or 400 army and navy officers, active and retired, who form a large permanent colony, and the monthly compensation of these 19,446 civilian employes amounts to \$1,635,708.51. Therefore the aggregate sum in salaries annually paid out in Washington by the Government disbursing clerks reaches the enormous total of \$19,628,502.72. Besides, probably not less than \$3,000,000 additional goes to the Senators and Congressmen and their subordinates and perhaps \$1,250,000 more to the army and navy officials, most of whom are of high rank with large pay, there being constantly in Washington not less than sixty generals and admirals active and retired. These totals form a grand aggregate of \$23,878,050.72 annually paid out in Washington in the single item in salaries.

The Mosquito Plague—200 dead Horses in Hyde County.
As terrible, almost, as any one of the seven plagues of Egypt has been the plague of mosquitoes that visited some of the eastern counties of North Carolina.

They stung people to the point of positive torment, at some places rendering work in the fields an impossibility; they drove cattle so far into the bays and streams that they were drowned; caused sheep and calves to run themselves to death in an attempt to escape their attacks. At night fires had to be built about residences, stables and cattle yards that the smoke might drive off enough of the mosquitoes to make rest or sleep possible.


