TAR HEEL GLEANINGS.

Franklington is to have electric lights and water works.

The town of Albemarle sold its graded school bonds for 101%.

Practically all the newspapers in the State have now declared in favor of a compulsory education.

The Mountain Island Mills property was sold at public auction Wednesday at Dallas and was knocked down to the attorney for the bond holders at \$175,000.

At the great educational rally at Rogers' Cross Roads, in Nash county, at which Gov. Aycock and Treasurer Lacy spoke Sept. 12, barbecue was served to several thousand people.

A cloud burst early Sunday morning wrought havoc among the residences in the most fashionable section of Cleveland, Ohio, the damage to private property is estimated at \$1,000,000.

A special from Asheville says that Maj. H. C. Hunt's handsome boarding house, "Mountain Cottage," was burned Wednesday night. The occupants barely escaped with their lives, leaving in their night clothes, or wrapped in blankets.

A Wilmington lunacy commission has declared a young white man of that place crazy because he could not overcome a maddening infatuation for pretty girls. That fellow is not crazy; he knows a good thing when he sees it, remarks the Charlotte News.

Here's a snake story proper, told by the Sampson Democrat: "Last week an old mother moccasin was killed at Boykin's Bridge. As she was expiring thirty-five young moccasins, varying in length from ten to 15 inches marched out of her mouth. It was a snaky time in that vicinity, but this is no joke."

The State pension board continues its work of sifting the deserving pensioners from the great mass of those approved by county boards. Not a few of the county boards exercised but little judgment, merely endorsing favorably all applications. The oldest pensioner thus far found is in Jones county, his age being 101. There are many of 90 and over.

Asheboro Courier: Some twenty years or more ago Bascom H. Palmer read law in Asheboro under Hon. M. S. Robbins. He obtained his license and located in Lexington, N. C., where he practiced a short while. He went to Lake City, Fla., seventeen years ago and has since then served as State's Attorney, twice a member of the State Senate. Last week he was appointed judge of the Circuit

court of the Third Judicial district. Judge Palmer is a native of this county and has a brother and sister living at Liberty.

Kittrell correspondent of News & Observer Sept. 12, says: It is rumored that a large sum of gold has recently been found in Granville county not very far from this place. Emmett Woodlief is given as the name of the finder, and the Charlotte Smith farm as the place. It is said to be in half eagles and to amount to \$50,000, less \$150. The find was made under an old stump in the woods. The tin vessel in which the gold had been buried, had crumbled to dust. The story is given for what it is worth, though the rumor is a persistent one. It is generally believed that some has been thus found.
