A WORD TO CRITICS.

We have in the main successfully conducted the Oxford Public Ledger. We have, of course, made mistakes. No editor, or any other man, has accomplished anything who has not made mistakes.

We have not especially sought popularity, but we have striven to do right and to keep on the right side of public questions. We believe that the good people of Oxford and Granville county will bear us out in the assertion that, in the majority of cases, we have succeeded in doing this.

If to have opinions and to speak them out is wrong, we have certainly done wrong. For this we have always done and always expect to do. We have not stood for the opinion of any particular man, men, or set of men.

Of two facts we are satisfied: We have by hard work night and day succeeded in building up a good patronage and believe that a majority of our patrons, and also a majority of the best people generally, stand by our positions; we further believe that the State press, judging from the recognition it gives us, as well as our own people, agree that we conduct one of the best weeklies in the State—and with this verdict we are satisfied.

You Are Talking Sense.

We North Carolinians have talked much about the Tillman case in South Carolina and have been indignant because we realized that Tillman would escape. We are Pharisees and hypocrites. We are no better than South Carolina in this respect and we know it. Any man of prominence or influence or one who can command the help of prominent and influential friends, can commit murder in this State with almost every assurance that his punishment at most will be but a few years in the State prison.

Death of a Freak of Nature.

Rutherfordton Dispatch: News reaches here that Geo. Radnall is dead. The boy was one of the most wonderful freaks of nature in the south or perhaps in the world. He carried on his shoulders one of the largest and heaviest heads of any person known. He lived near Ellenboro with his parents. He was 6 years old when he died and weighed only 65 pounds. His head measured 46 inches in circumference and weighed 50 pounds.

Candidate for Governor on Anti-Negro Platform.

The closing of the postoffice at Indianapolis, Miss., by order of President Roosevelt, because the white people objected to a negro postmaster, has made it a campaign issue in Mississippi.

Major Varadaman, a veteran of the Spanish-American war, who fought at Santiago, has announced himself a candidate for Governor on an "Anti-Negro" platform and proposer to divide the public school fund of the State between the races according to the amount of taxes paid by each race.

He has succeeded in stirring up sentiment among the white people in favor of such a law. This will close 75 per cent. of the negro public schools in the State.

Gave Birth to Four Children.

Burnsville Eagle: We learn from a gentleman just from Madison county that Mrs. Bud Boon, who lives at Georgetown, gave birth to four children a few days ago. This same mother gave birth to three children 2 years ago. Gov. Aycock's attention is hereby called to the above facts and a present of \$100 each should be given the children by the State.

THE WATTS BILL.

The following is the full text of the Watts bill as it passed the Legislature, except the last sections, which provide for elections in the towns: "The General Assembly of North Carolina do enact:

"Section 1. That it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, firm or corporation to manufacture, sell or otherwise dispose of for gain, any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors, or intoxicating bitters within the State of North Carolina, except in incorporated cities and towns wherein the sale or manufacture of liquor is not or may not hereafter be prohibited or regulated by special statute: Provided, that this act shall not be construed to forbid the sale of such spirituous, vinous or malt liquors by druggists for sickness upon the written prescription of a legally qualified physician, having such sick person under his charge: Provided further, that this act shall not be construed as to apply to wine or elder manufactured from grapes, berries or fruit on the lands of the person so manufacturing, or purchased by the manufacturer from the growers thereof: Provided further, that this act shall not be construed to apply to brandy manufactured from fruit or grapes and sold in original packages of not less than five gallons.

"Sec. 2. That it shall be unlawful for any person, persons, firm or corporation to manufacture, sell or otherwise dispose of for gain any spirituous, vinous or malt liquors, or intoxicating bitters, except as hereinbefore provided, in any incorporated city or town, without first obtaining, as provided by law, a license therefor both from the Board of Commissioners of the county in which said town or city is situated and from the Board of Aldermen or City Councilmen, or the governing authorities, by whatever name called, of said city or town.

"Sec. 3. That any person violating the provisions of this act with reference to the sale, or disposition for gain, of spirituous, vinous or malt liquors or intoxicating bitters, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be imprisoned not exceeding six months, or fined not exceeding \$200, or both, in the discretion of the court.

"Sec. 4. That any person violating the provisions of this act with reference to the manufacture of spirituous, vinous or malt liquors, or intoxicating bitters, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall upon conviction be imprisoned not less than four months nor more than two years, or fined not less than \$200 nor more than \$1,000, or both, in the discretion of the court; second offence felony.

"Sec. 5. That any physician who shall make any prescription, except in the case of sickness, for the purpose of aiding or abetting any person or persons who are not bona fide under his charge, to purchase any intoxicating liquors contrary to the provisions of this act, and any druggist who shall duplicate the prescription of a physician for intoxicating liquors for any person or persons not bona fide under his charge, without the written direction of the physician who gave the same, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined or imprisoned, or both, in the discretion of the court, for each and every offense; and all druggists selling intoxicating liquors by prescription as aforesaid shall keep a record thereof which shall bear the true dates of the sales and be subject at all times to the inspection of the solicitor of the district and of the mayor and police officers of the city or town in which said druggist's business is located (and all other persons); and any such druggist failing to keep the record aforesaid, or refusing to permit examination of such record by the officers named and all other persons shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and fined or imprisoned, or both, in the discretion of the court.

"Sec. 6. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell wine manufactured from fruit or grapes grown by himself in quantities less than one gallon, and said wine shall not be drunk upon the premises where sold. Any person violating the provisions of this section, either by selling in quantities less than one gallon or by drinking wine on the premises where sold, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and punished at the discretion of the court: Provided, that the provisions of this section shall not apply to churches wishing to procure wine for communion services."

The last sections of the bill provide for elections in the towns upon the petition of one-fourth of the registered voters, upon the questions of dispensary, distillery and license.
