The following clipping taken from the Raleigh Evening Times will be of much interest to Oxford people: "The Home Mission Board of the Presbyterian Church of the United States has declined the country estate, 'Beaux Chenes,' presented to them as a gift by John Roebbling, the multi-millionaire son of Colonel Roebbling, of Brooklyn bridge fame. Mr. Roebbling announced his intention of abandoning his estate, which joins that of George W. Vanderbilt's 'Biltmore,' and to leave Asheville, because the town has voted 'dry.' On account of his views against prohibition, he has been notified by the home board of missions that they regret they cannot accept his offer. Mr. Roebbling then made the same offer to the Episcopal Church which has accepted the gift, through Bishop Horner, of North Carolina, and the Episcopal Mission Board."
