Granville Gets One of The Six A & M. Farm Schools This Year—Will be Held at Stem Dec. 8, 9, and 10.

Granville is lucky this year in getting one of the six Farm Schools that the A. & M. College authorities are running for the good of the public.

Communication has been held with Prof. I. O. Schaub, who has just conducted a school in Forsyth and the decision has been reached to hold the School at Stem upon a date shortly to be announced.

Prof. Schaub with other teachers from the College will in three days give free tuition to the farmers, giving them such valuable instruction and help as can be done within the short compass of three days.

The judging of horses, selecting of seed, and numbers of useful bits of farm helps will be brought to the attention of those in attendance, and every farmer should be present and pay close attention each day.

It makes no difference how busy a farmer thinks he will be on those dates, he cannot afford to miss the schooling. While it has cost right considerably to arrange for these schools, the tuition is absolutely free, and the results will be far reaching.

Let every farmer remember the dates, the 8th, 9th, and 10th, of December and be on hand early and stay late.
