Heredity is the most potent influence upon our lives; we earnestly wish our friend may live over again in the lives and characters of his six children, and we believe he rests for his labors in the eternal home prepared for those who are faithful here. Widow, Children, Friends, Take comfort for the struggles of this life, and hope for the life to come from the faithful, the truly successful, the high and noble life of our departed friend.

**MEETING GREAT SUCCESS**

FRIDAY NIGHT MARKS CLOSE OF BIGGEST MEETING EVER HELD BY UNION.

The Three Hundred Delegates Go To Their Homes Highly Delighted with Result of the Meeting and Oxford People Have Immensely Enjoyed Their Visit.

Friday night marked the close of the greatest meeting of the Women's Missionary Union ever had and the three hundred guests of the people of Oxford went away in the greatest of spirits. The president, Miss Heck, was deeply gratified with the results and was assiduous in expressing acknowledgment of the courtesies of the Oxford public.  
The keynote to this year's meeting was, Larger Service, and every action was taken with this in view. The great interest manifested by the Laymen's movement lead the women of the Baptist church to take an increased interest in the work and to augment its scope. The intention is to have every woman, young woman, and child to give a regular weekly contribution to missions. To this end 150 new Mission Societies, 40 Young Women's Societies, and 20 Royal Ambassadors will be organized in accordance with the decision to put the forces into commission, these being the four classes of Societies under the auspices of the Union.

Superintending the State work is the general committee located at Raleigh, this being composed of the officers and 14 ladies of the different foreign churches. They will be at the head of a greatly increased movement. There are now nearly 1,000 societies on the mailing list and there are from 9,000 to 10,000 members.

This reported \$30,000 does not include the local church contributions or ministerial or any other of the collections. The sum is expended in missions in the strictest sense.  
"Unlike the Baptist State Convention the women foster nothing save mission interests. They give to state home and foreign missions, to the Louisville Training School at which young women are trained for mission work and to the support of the Margaret Home, which is located in Greenville, S. C. In this home the children of missionaries are placed for the purpose of attending school and having all the care that could be given them by a motherly Christian woman.

The officers elected to serve during the ensuing year are: President, Miss Mary Heck; vice-presidents, Mrs. William Archer, of Shelby; Mrs. Livingston Johnson, of Raleigh; Mrs. C. L. Haywood, of Durham; Corresponding Secretary, Mrs. Elizabeth Briggs of Raleigh; Band Superintendent, Mrs. J. S. Farmer; Recording Secretary, Miss Bradshear, of Raleigh; Treasurer, Mrs. W. N. Jones, of Raleigh; Secretary Young Women's Auxiliary, Miss Mary K. Applewhite, of Raleigh.

Miss Heck, who has served for years so efficiently was of course the logical candidate for the head of the State Union, which she will preside over in her meeting at Baltimore in May. With her will go 20 delegates from North Carolina. Mrs. Moore, on account of sickness in her family, had to resign from the secretaryship, which office she had filled for three years most ably and Miss Briggs was elected to serve in her stead. Miss Briggs has been Band Superintendent for 12 years, and when the young folks heard that she was elected to another office, there was a mighty protest, for Miss Briggs had been exceedingly popular in her office. Mrs. Farmer accepted the band superintendent temporarily until a successor can be named.

It was decided to hold the meeting in Wilmington next year. This year's meeting marked the presence of several foreign missionaries, Dr. and Mrs. George Green, of Canton China; Rev. Carey Newton, formerly pastor at Greensboro, now of North China, and Mrs. N. Maynard, of Japan.
