The clovers save the land from washing in the same way and in addition to this are beneficial by being able to take nitrogen of the soil. But to grow these later crops successfully the soil must contain the bacteria peculiar to the particular crop grown.

It has been the experience nany of our farmers that any crop grown after a winter-cover crop, when turned under at the proper time in the spring, and disked well before and after turning, will produce a great deal more, often as much as 50 per cent more, than if no winter-cover crop had been grown. The seed for a cover crop will cost from one to five dollars an acre according to kind and quan tity of seed used. This should save to the soil and add to the next year's crop more than twice stop work, it staggers you. the cost of the cover crop.
