CHARLOTTE LIKELY TO GET BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Local Committee Expects to Offer \$100,000 as Inducement to Officials

The Charlotte Observer says that the prospects for the location of the proposed \$250,000 Baptist hospital in Charlotte are good, according to leading Baptists who say \$100,000 is expected to be offered by Charlotte as inducement to the Baptist state convention.

Dr. Luther Little, pastor of the First Baptist church, and chairman of the committee named to select the site, states that the local committee holds options on several properties in Charlotte deemed suitable for the Baptist institution.

Dr. Little will appear before the state convention meeting in Asheville in November and present the data offered by North Carolina cities. The convention will have final "say-so" in the matter, but it is said, will be influenced by the recommendation of the committee headed by Dr. Little.

The Baptist hospital will have both pay and charity wards, but its charity wards will be a feature of the institution. Since the hospital will be maintained by appropriations from the \$75,000,000 fund raised last year, no funds will be asked of city or county officials, promoters say. However, the hospital officials will be open for proposals if the hospital is officially designated by city and county authorities, it is said.

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NOTICE RESIDENCE PROPERTY OWNERS

The Health Officer has the right to assume that every resident property owner in Oxford has learned that there is a law requiring that no person shall maintain or use a residence located within 300 YARDS of another residence without a sanitary privy, unless the owner be connected with town sewerage, or have septic tank for the disposal of human waste.

Notice is given that the county Health Officer has had directions to proceed against all violators of this law. He does not like this method of solving Oxford's safety problem. Oxford's safety is the safety of every property owner or his tenant. Therefore the law should in the interest of every individual be complied with without prosecution. It is safer, pleasanter, less trouble.

Every owner or tenant is hereby called upon to be a law abiding citizen, learn promptly how to comply with this public need and law, get his privy right, AND DO IT NOW! Prosecution will have to follow inspection which finds an insanitary privy. No compromise privy! That is to gamble with sickness and death. It must be fly and mosquito proof. It must be properly ventilated. It must not overflow with water from any source. Seat covers must fit fly tight, and must be hinged securely, and close automatically. Get these points, or it will not pass. Country people take notice this applies to their residences within 300 yards of other residences.

HUMAN CURIOS

The Siamese Twins.

Strangely enough, though known to this day as the "Siamese" twins, Chang and Eng were the children of a Chinaman, born about May, 1811. The twins, joined together by a cartilaginous band which could not be cut for fear of causing their death, were both feeble at birth, though Chang afterward thrived while Eng continued delicate.

They were really discovered by Robert Hunter, a British merchant in the Orient, who prevailed upon their parents to apprentice them to him for purposes of exhibition. After an eight weeks' tour of the United States, in the course of which they were examined by a number of the leading scientists, they were exhibited in London, in 1829, but were forbidden to show themselves in France.

After their European tour they returned to the United States and settled down as farmers in North Carolina, taking the name of Bunker and, when forty-four years of age, they married two sisters, English women, aged twenty-six and twenty-eight. Chang had six children and Eng had five, all healthy, strong and without the slightest indication of the deformity which made their fathers unique. All the contemporary writers place especial emphasis upon the love and affection which the brothers showed for each other up until the moment of their death, January 17, 1874.

While extremely unusual on account of their long lives, the Siamese twins were not entirely unique with respect to their physical union—as there are several other cases mentioned of similar twin-births, though the children usually did not live long.
