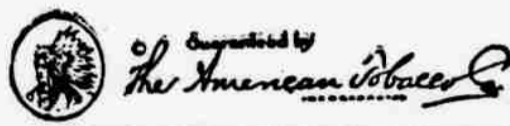

8. Do not wear a beard and keep your hair short.

9. Eat and drink in moderation and slowly. Eat at meal time. Do not eat in between meals. Do not eat uncooked food. And don't allow flies to settle on your food. Drink plenty of water, but be sure it is good water. Don't drink water from an unknown source.

10. If your skin has been broken by a blister or wound keep the place covered to prevent infection.

11. Take plenty of sleep, at least eight hours every night. You should wake up "full of pep."

12. Take care of your feet. Keep them clean and dry. Keep the nails trimmed. See that your shoes and socks fit properly.

13. Be regular and temperate in all your habits.

14. Take recreation and exercise, a little every day. Don't overdo or overstrain.

15. Stay serene. Don't brood or worry.

16. Don't be afraid to work hard and to study hard to realize some worthwhile ambition. Get into the habit of concentrating when traveling to and from work. You can in this way add perhaps two hours to your working day.

17. If you meet the right sort of girl, and she'll have you, marry her quickly if you can possibly afford it.

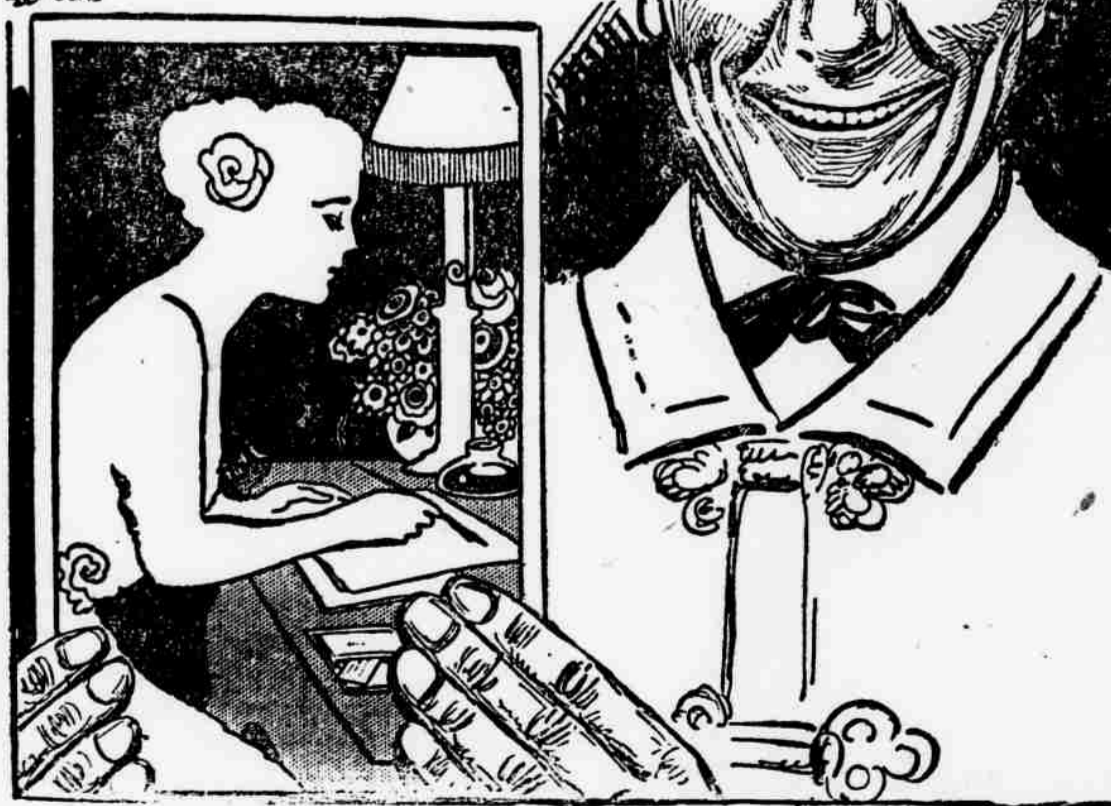

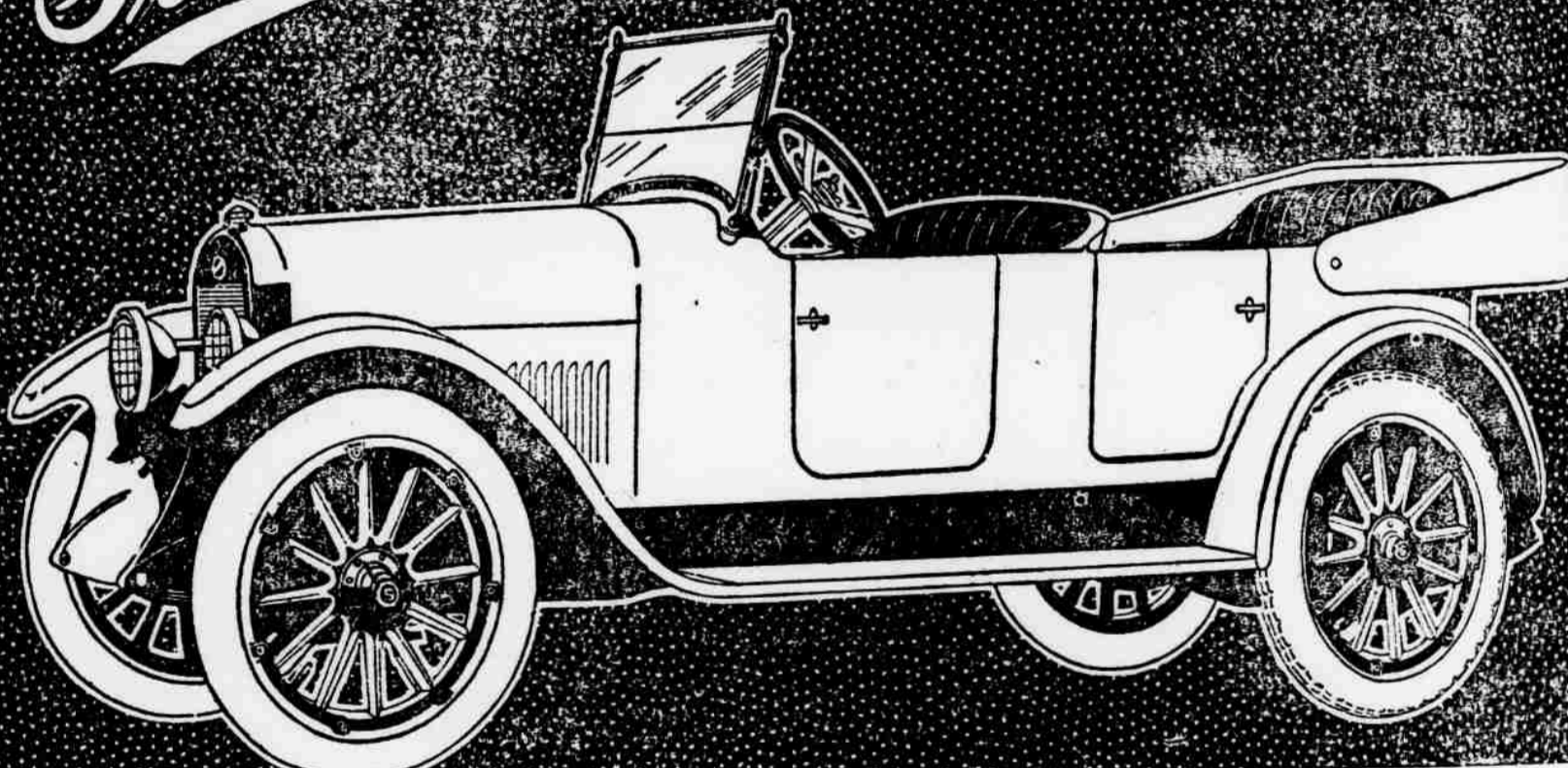
