**BAPTIZED A DOG**

**And Asked Divine Blessing On French Fried Potatoes**

Boston Special: Rev. Edwin Curtis, who incurred the displeasure of the Boston Presbytery when he baptized a dog and invoked divine blessings on French fried potatoes, holds the pastorate of the First Presbyterian church of Brookline under sanction of the law, the Supreme court ruled in a decision by the full bench.

The court dismissed a bill in equity brought by a minority of the church society which sought to restrain use of the church property because Mr. Curtis did not have the approval of the Presbytery. It was ruled that the great majority of the members of the church favored Mr. Curtis' retention and so there was no controversy recognizable by the court.


**A Card Of Thanks.**

—Returns from banded birds sent in to the Biological Survey of the United States Department of Agriculture constantly throw new light on the long distances traveled by migratory birds in their instinctive search for a warm place to winter. Mallard duck No. 102755, banded at Browning, Ill., on March 12 of this year, was killed November 9 about 7 miles southwest of Lexington,

Nebr., about 600 miles west. No. 102470, also a mallard duck, banded at Browning on March 7, was shot November 12 at Leavenworth, Kans., some 500 miles west of where it started. Both of these ducks probably made a spring flight northward and then south in the fall to the point of capture.

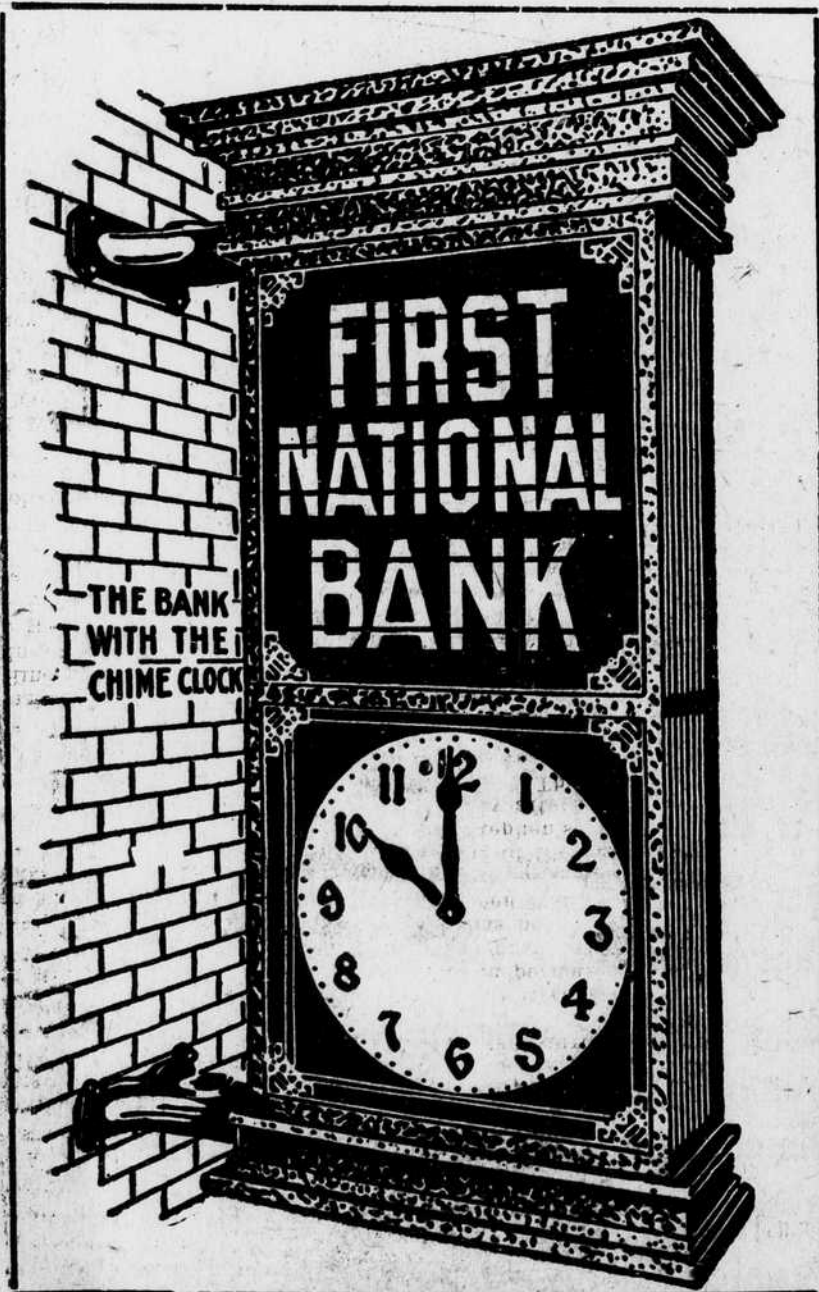
