



Why Sailors Tatoo Their Bodies. The practice of tateoing, which men of the still favor, was first derived from their visits to uncivilized tribes of India. No doubt the first sailor who observed a tatooed native was interested, and the only way he could tell the folks back hom ewhat he had seen was to bring a sample of it on himself. Later a tatoo mark on some part of the body was a sure isgn of a much-traveled man.

Tatooing is of two kinds. One methof is to make small punctures in the skin into which dyes are put, according to the design planned. The other method is accomplished by repeatedly making cuts in the skin so that the resulting scars, without the addition of coloring matter, will form the design when healed Color tatooing has always been more or less oramental but scar-tattooing is more frequently used to produce distin guishing tribal marks-even of different ranks within the tribe. Some tribes scar the whole body-others only certain portions.


