THE CHINESE SYSTEM

It would probably delight the physicians if all their patients would follow the plan adopted by Samuel Vauclain, president of Bolwin's Locomotive works, and pay an annual retainer to keep them in health.

Mr. Vauclain has made a ten-year agreement with his doctor according to which the doctor will keep him well in return for payment increasing in amount each year as the patient grows older. The payment is to be deducted for such time as he may be sick. The plan is working very well.

Most of us postpone consulting a doctor as long as possible, and then it frequently happens that the doctor tells us that if we had gone to him a week or two earlier he could have checked in its incipient stages whatever ailed us and could have saved us a lot of suffering.
