A DRY DECISION

According to a decision just handed down by the Supreme Court. neither the Eighteenth Amendment nor the Volstead act protects a man who violates more rigid prohibitions affairs of the community. on the sale of liquor made by local authorities.

The point was raised by a druggist permit to dispense sixteen ounces of liquor within ten days on a physician's prescription. There is a city ordinance in Los Angeles which forbids druggists to dispense more than Chapel Hill, N. C. eight ounces.
