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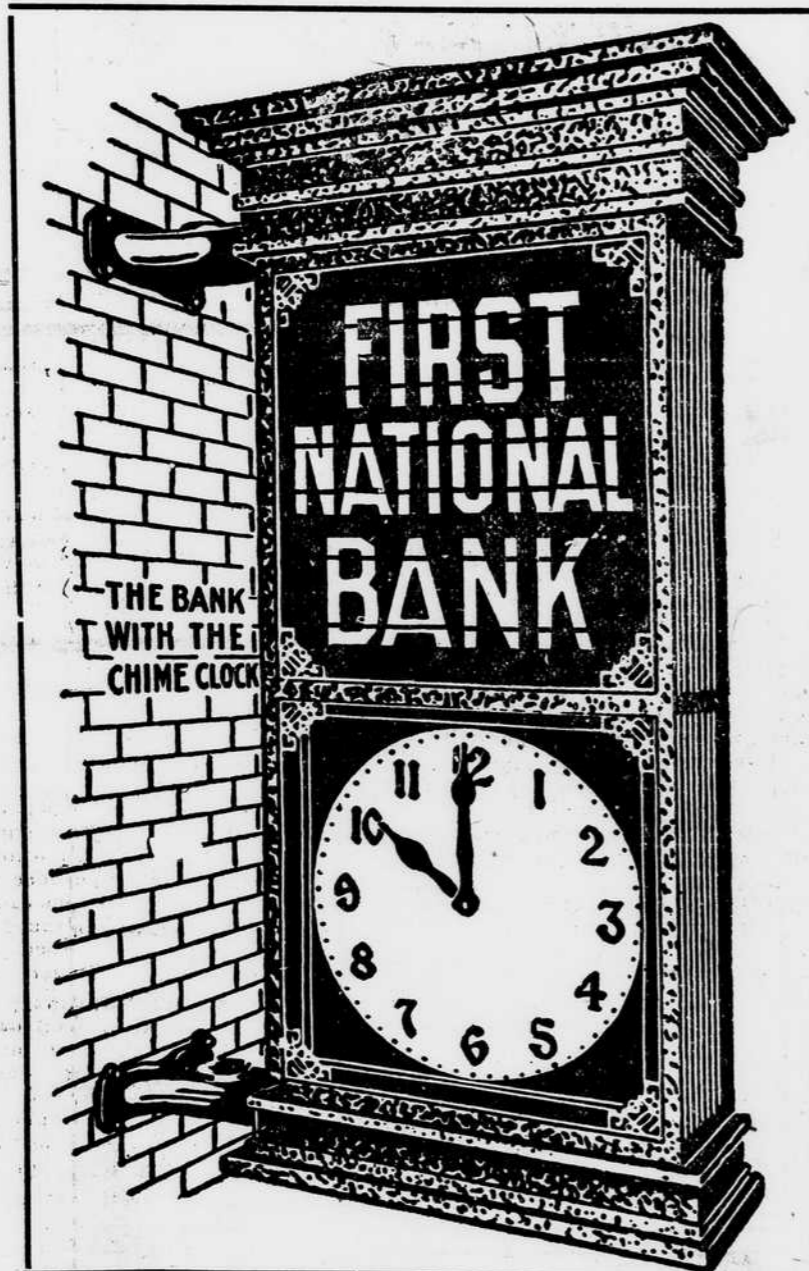
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P. S.—Shred fresh pineapple from the core with a fork, and put in jars with an equal amount of sugar, for fruit sundaes.
