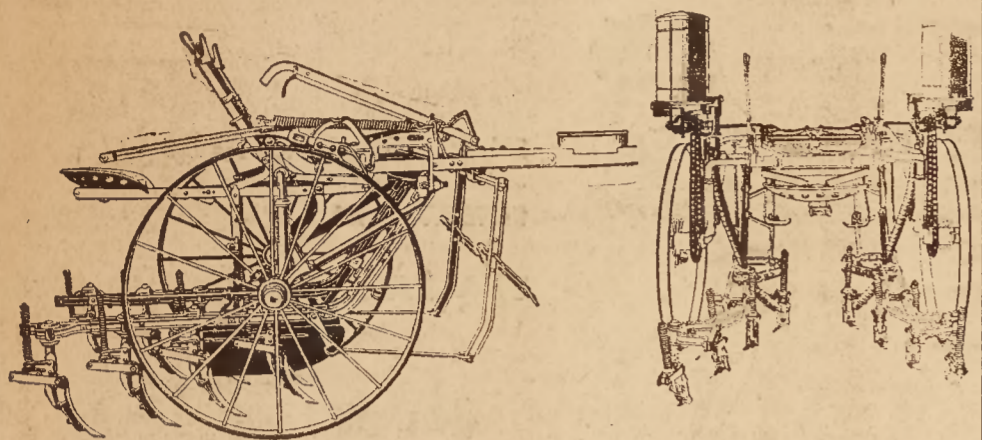
Kennon Taylor, Jr., student at Davidson College, is spending the spring holidays at home with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. K. Taylor.

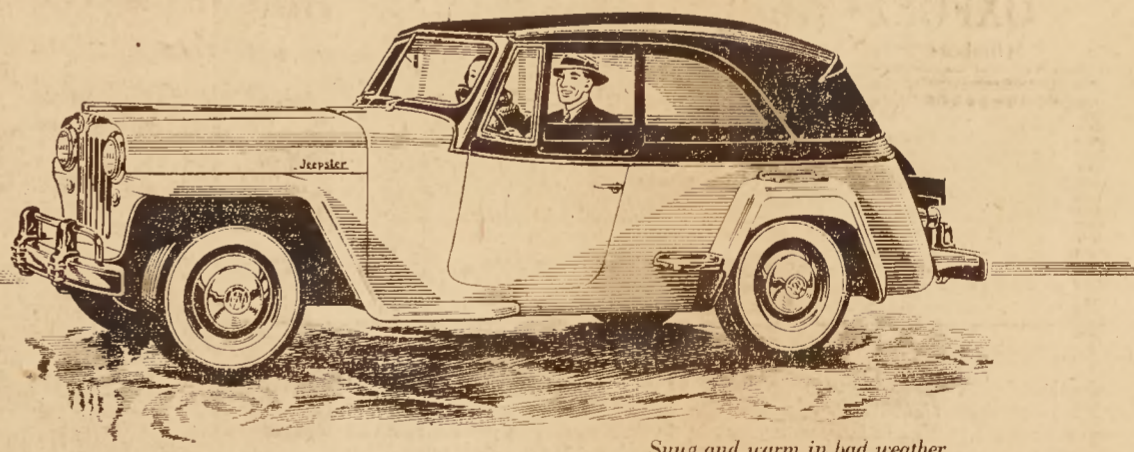

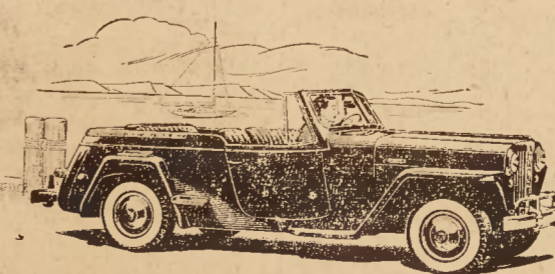
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
