State Tax Collector Cites New Plan For Fixing Schedule B
The 1950 Census will be used in determining State Schedule "B" License tax liability for the tax year beginning June 1, 1951, according to information furnished

by P. D. Robbins, Jr., local Deputy Collector for the North Carolina Department of Revenue.
Mr. Robbins calls attention to the fact that many Privilege Licenses are based on population and suggests that the taxpayers refer to the Schedule "B" Partial List, which is being mailed together with application blanks to taxpayers throughout the State within the next few days. Privilege Licenses not based on population will not be affected by these population changes.

The 1950 population figures, subject to correction, for some of the places in Granville County are listed below: Oxford, 6,703.
If any taxpayers in Granville County are in doubt as to their correct tax liability or need assistance in filing their applications, Mr. Robbins suggests that they contact him at the Sheriff's office, which is in the Courthouse in Oxford, N. C., on each Tuesday between 11 a. m. and 12 noon.
