Whitney Award Is Won By An Oxford Teacher

Israel Everett Glover to Continue Work Toward Ph. D. Degree

Israel Everett Glover of Oxford, has received an Opportunity Fellowship for 1953, the John Hay Whitney Foundation of New York announced today.

Glover is one of 52 young men and women, all potential community leaders, who won over \$100,000 in fellowships this year. He is an associate professor of mathematics at Langston University, Oklahoma. He plans to continue work on dissertation for Ph.D. in mathematics from Oklahoma A&M College.

Glover received his B.S. degree from Johnson C. Smith University at Charlotte, and his M.A. degree at the University of Michigan. He also attended the University of Rochester. He has worked as an instructor, associate professor, mathematician and industrial engineer. He has also done research with the Bell Aircraft Company and the Wright Patterson Air Force Base. He was recently elected vice president of the Oklahoma section of the Mathematical Association of America. He was the first Negro to be elected to this position.

Among this year's winners are Negroes, Spanish-Americans, Chinese-Americans, Japanese-Americans, Puerto Ricans, American Indians, a native of the Marshall Islands and displaced persons.

The awards for training and study are made each year to American citizens of exceptional promise who, because of arbitrary barriers such as race, cultural background, or region of residence, have not had the fullest opportunity to develop their abilities.

Most of the award winners will return to their communities and with their new knowledge and experience, work toward the betterment of local economic, educational and social standards.
