Every individual, family, or business organization should have some kind of Reserve to serve as a cushion to protect against unusual emergencies. The Oxford Credit Union has provided such a Reserve.

The law which controls Credit Unions in this State requires that the officers set aside as a Reserve twenty per cent of the net earnings before any dividends are paid. The Association has faithfully complied with this requirement and this statutory fund now amounts to over \$20,000. Up to this time nothing has been deducted from it. In addition to this required reserve another \$20,000 has been set aside. All of this increases the safety of the Association. These two funds stand between the shareholders and any possible loss.

It is recommended that all members of this Association establish such a fund as a primary safeguard against emergency misfortunes. If this reserve does not have to be used until old age, it will come in as a great help at that time.
