

#### School Children **Getting Facts On Forest Resources**

Southern States Forest Fire Commission is Emphasizing Conservation

How Granville County timber growers may save tens of thousands of dollars by carefully selecting the trees to sell for paperwood instead of clearing off long body pines, poplars and gums is being emphasized in material sent to schools of this area by the Southern States Forestfire Commission, Inc., non-profit educational group that is financed by banking, lumber, veneer and wood industries of 20

An attempt is being made by the commission and associate groups to reach the students of schools and colleges here on a conservation program of education that encourages one and all to hold to not less than one hundred healthy long body saplings on each acre cut over for paperwood instead of denuding the acreage. Denuding, it is pointed out, means there will be no more cash crops for logs to the owner during the present generation. In other words, the land owner loses the production each year for thirty or forty years but if a stand is left he gets the increased cash profits by increased number of board feet regu-

Due to the drouth, unexpected demands on the farmer and others. he often feels forced to cash out to the extent of his ability on any timber he holds.

However, where it is possible for him to borrow money, he will find that a little tree that sells for a dime now will bring a dollar if held for eight or ten years more.

In order to implement the work the commission expects to send one more speakers to some of our schools and also is listing with the school authorities of this area a series of sound color motion pictures which are available on loan with out cost excepting transportation.

#### **Hunting Season Can** Offer Fun or Tragedy

The hunting season is often as dangerous to the hunter as it is to the hunted. County Agent C. V. Morgan cautions that with more hunters in the field than ever before, common sense should be the by-word in handling guns and that consideration of the rights and safety of others should always be observed.

Morgan points also to this impor tant reminder-the true hunter displays both sportsmanship and safety. He knows how to use the right gun for the right game. He hunts only in season and does not take the limit unless he can use the meat or trophies.

For bird hunting, the hunter takes a trained dog to retrieve cripples. He puts out camptires and rigarettes carefully, breaks matches before dropping them, and in other ways shows that he is "using his head."

The county agent calls attention to these "10 commandments" of the true sportsman: 1: Treat every gun as if it were

2. Carry only empty guns taken down or with the action open, into your auto, camp and home. 3. Be sure that the barrel and ac-

tion are clear of obstructions. 4: Always carry your gun so that your can control the direction of the muzzle, even if you stumble

5: Be sure of your target before pulling the trigger. 6: Never point a gun at anything you do not want to shoot. 7. Never leave the gun unattend-

ed unless unloading it first. 3: Don't climb a tree or a fence with a loaded gun.

9. Don't shoot at a flat hard surface or the surface of water. 10: Do not mix gunpowder and
