Air Force Recruiters Get Splendid Results

After four months of operation as an independent organization, the United States Air Force recruiting service tallied a personnel procurement average of 99.8 per cent, according to Sgt. Jimmy Williams, in charge of the local Air Force recruiting station located in the court house.

"The achievement is notable," Sgt. Williams said, "because, while we were building towards an organization in July we were also operational. Even with this handicap we managed to wind up July's recruiting efforts with an 88.8 percentage."

Since then the program gained impetus and in August the recruiting service wound up with 96.3 per cent. September was the most fruitful and netted 114.9 per cent. October which was a rip and tuck month ended with 98.2 per cent.

Sgt. Williams attributed the high enlistment rate in the Air Force to the fact that, more and more young Americans have become aware of technical and educational training advantages available in the Air

Force. In their quest for knowledge and desire for learning trades and skills, thousands of America's youth voluntarily choose the Air Force as a branch of service which offers great opportunity, and at the same time enables them to meet their military service obligations.

In 1920 it took three pounds of coal to generate one kilowatt hour of electric energy.
