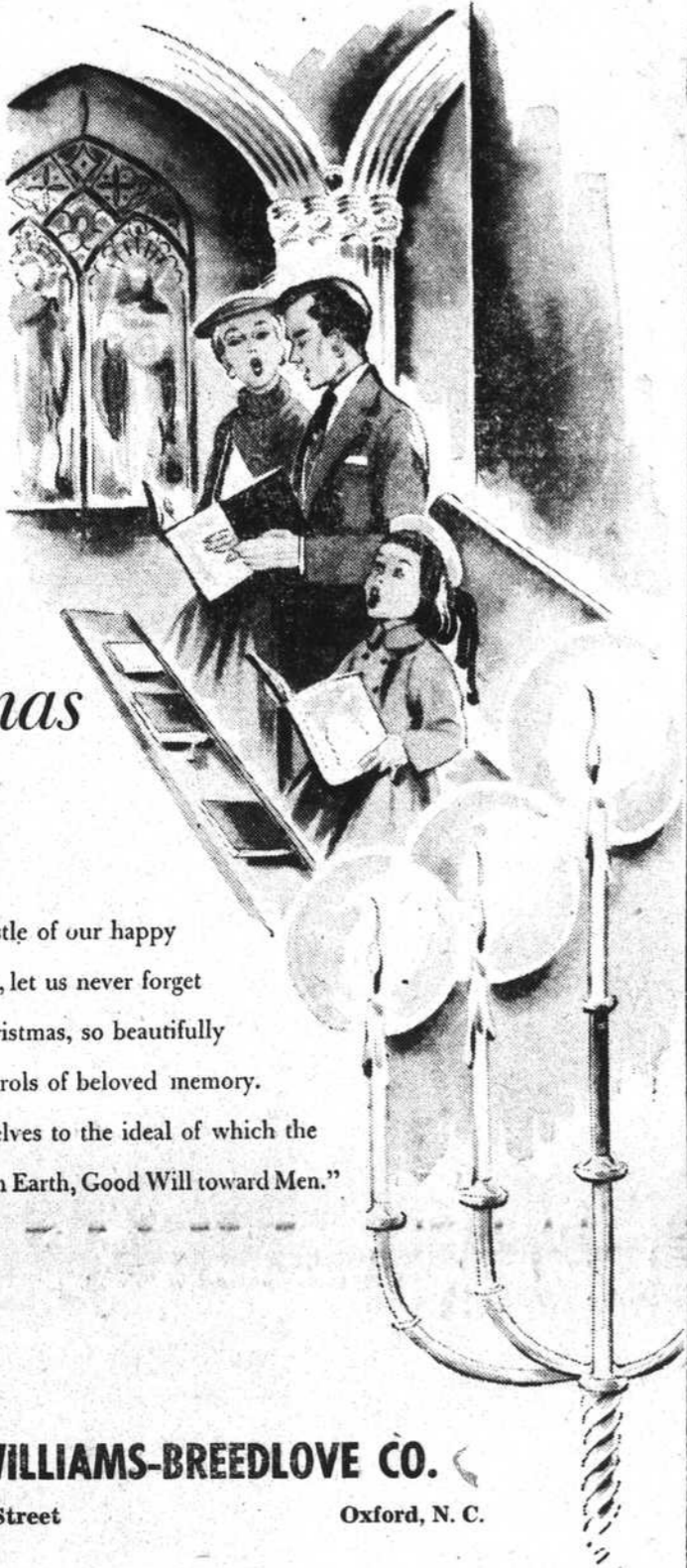
ented with a gift. A salad course in Christmas design, snowball cakes, nuts and coffee, were served.
